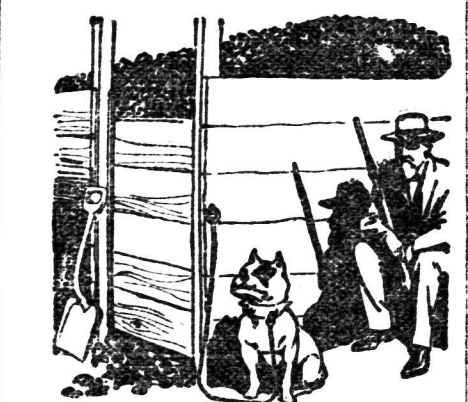

DR. CLARK CALLED IN FRITCH CASE

Testimony Relative to Miss Millman's Condition Unshaken.

Detroit, Feb. 17.—In the presence of a number of students from his medical classes at the Detroit College of Medicine Dr. John E. Clark, county chemist, gave expert testimony at the trial of Dr. George E. Fritch yesterday afternoon.

The physician merely confirmed the opinions of at least three of the physicians who preceded him on the stand. He admitted that from the microscopic examination he couldn't judge with accuracy Maybelle Millman's condition immediately previous to her death, but on the re-direct examination he stated emphatically that there was no doubt that the girl was in need of treatment.

INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENTS

Eighty-seven Fatalities in Canada During Month of January.

Ottawa, Feb. 17.—Industrial accidents occurring to 227 individual work people in Canada during the month of January, 1910, were reported to the department of labor. Of these, 87 were fatal, and 181 resulted in serious injuries. In addition, one fatal accident was reported as having taken place prior to the beginning of the month, information not having been received by the department before January, 1910.

The disasters of the month involving more than one fatality, were the derailment and wreck of a Canadian Pacific Railway train at Spanish River, near Webbwood, Ont., involving the loss of over 40 lives, among whom were five railway employees and two commercial travelers, and the killing of two loggers near Port Milford, Ont., by the falling of a tree.
