Dr. Hill's Address to the A. Y. P. A of St. Luke's Chturch.

Dr. W. H. Hill, director of the Institute of Public Health in this city, elivered a lecture last evening under the auspices of the A. Y. P. A. of the church in St. Luke's, Broughdale. There was a full attendance of members and many others of the congregation were present. The doctor's ddress was interesting and instruc-He spoke generally of health and disease, and dwelt mainly on the germs which produce malignant dis-By aid of the blackboard he llustrated these germs, and pointed out how they are received into the oody and cause disease. He discussed he evils arising from impure milk, from alcohol, and the house fly, and offered some valuable suggestions concerning each. Many traditional errors concerning hygiene were refuted, and some sound rules for health urged. He invited those present to visit the institute and become acquainted with ts working. On motion of Mr. F. C. Ryott, seconded by Mr. J. G. Boucher. a hearty vote of thanks was tendered Dr. Hill for his able lecture.

BOY IN A RUNAWAY FELL OVER FRONT AXLE

Fireman John Happer Stopped Animal Before the Lad Was Injured.

A rather sensational runaway, in which it was feared the driver of the outfit, owned by G. W. Kent, confectioner, Dundas street, would be badly hurt, occurred on Dundas street, between Clarence and Wellington streets, yesterday afternoon, about 5 o'clock. Fortunately, lowever, the boy in charge, although carried for a distance hanging over the front axle, escaped injury.

According to the lad's story, the horse, which he was driving westward on Dundas street, got beyond his control near Colborne street. At Waterloo street he Colborne street. Horace Vince, who was on duty between Wellington and Clarence streets, signalled the driver to proceed more slowly, and a moment later the boy, in his efforts to slacken, slipped out of his seat and fell across the front axle. The horse swung to the south side of the street and struck a pole, but was stopped before more serious damage was done by Fireman John Happer, of the Central station. Central station.

The boy, who was badly frightened, was carried into a store, but was later able to proceed unassisted.


