## FOUR ROOM ADDITION FOR CHESLEY AVENUE SCHOOL

Committee of Board of Education Meets Today to Consider Plans for Four-Room Addition to Accommodate Manual Training and Domestic Science Classes.

A four-room addition to Chesley avenue school is almost an assured fact now.

For some time residents of East London in the vicinity of the school have agitated for an addition to the school on account of having to send their children across the Grand Trunk tracks to Rectory street school to take up manual training and domestic science.

Chesley avenue school, which is one of the finest in the city, was built some years ago, and at that time there was ample room to accommodate the children of that section, but in the past few years East London has grown so rapidly that the school at present is overcrowded.

There has been considerable agitation for an addition to the school, but the board of education was handicapped last

year to such an extent that it was impossible for it to undertake the erection of the addition.

The question was brought up at a meeting of No. 2 committee of the board at a recent meeting, and two sets of plans for an addition have been prepared. They will be submitted to the committee at a meeting this afternoon, and some recommendation will likely be sent to the board at its next meeting.

"I don't think there is any question of the addition being built," said Mr. A. M. Hunt, chairman of No. 2 committee. "It is an absolute necessity, and I think it might as well be built as soon as possible. Every day these children are forced to cross the railroad tracks we are endangering their lives, and I think that the board will decide to spend the money on the addition this spring."

## AGED RESIDENT DIES IN EAST LONDON

Mrs. Elizabeth Whaley Passes Away at Home of Daughter.

The death of Mrs. Elizabeth Whaley, a well-known resident of this city, occurred at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John Sheehy, 274 Hamilton road, on Thursday afternoon, Mrs. Whaley was in her 80th year. She leaves to survive one son, Robert Davidson, in Detroit, and three daughters—Mrs. John Sheehy, this city; Mrs. Martin, of Columbus, O., and Miss Agnes, at home. The funeral will take place on Saturday afternoon. Services will be conducted by the Rev. T. B. Clarke, at 2:30 o'clock, and interment will be made in Woodland Cemetery.

## STREET CAR DERAILED

Ottawa Car Left Rails at Corner of Redan and Rectory and Blocked Traffic.

An Ottawa car, loaded with workmen, left the tracks on the Hamilton road, near Redan street, this morning at 6:30 and ran diagonally across the road until it reached the curb.

The passengers, although considerably shaken up, were not injured in any way. Traffic was delayed for some time, and while an attempt was being made to put the car back on the tracks the other cars had to be backed up to switching points.

## WANT FREE LIBRARY IN OLD TOWN HALL

Workingmen of That Section Cannot Get Down Town to Secure Books.

Residents of East London want a branch of the free library located in that section. They claim that part of the old town hall at the corner of Dundas and Rectory streets could be renovated for a small sum of money and that books to satisfy the needs of the workmen could be installed for a small amount.

There are thousands of workmen who reside in East London, east of Adelaide street, who never get much opportunity to go to the public library for books, and such an institution in East London would prove of inestimable value to them.

"We would appreciate such a thing in East London if the city should decide to give us a library," said a workman to the Advertiser. "We would not ask for a fine building, with tiled floors and ornate ceilings, but would like to have a number of good books. There are hundreds of men living in this section, too, who contribute to the support of the library but never derive any benefits from it. When we get home from work at night after a hard day in the factory we do not feel like dressing up to go down to the library to get a book, but just the same we would like very much if we could have a book to read the same as our more fortunate brothers who live nearer the heart of the city and who have time to go and secure one."

"The establishment of a small library out here would not cost the city much, and would be a source of considerable pleasure to the workman."

## Death of Hennessy Infant.

Herbert Julian Hennessy, the infant son of Wm. A. and Lucy E. Hennessy, 576 English street, died on Thursday morning. The funeral arrangements are not completed as yet, pending the arrival of the child's father, who is in Portland, Ore.

## MANY MORE HOTELS NEEDED IN LONDON

East London Progressives to Confer With Other Organizations.

BIG CONVENTION COMING

Wheel Tax Recommended as Means of Maintaining Good Roads.

"What we want in this city is more hotels," said Mr. J. Pearson at the meeting of the East End Progressive Association on Thursday evening.

"When the new market is established we want a first-class farmers' hotel and two or three second-class hotels in the neighborhood. We don't want any third-class hotels."

He pointed out the need in this city for more hotels.

Big Convention Coming.

"Conventions and big gatherings of any kind cannot come to London because there is no accommodation for visitors," he said. "The hotels could not billet the people who came to the auto show, and when the medical convention comes, to which about 375 doctors are expected, I don't know what we'll do."

Mr. Wm. Wakeling asked what would become of the new hotel proprietors when there were no conventions in the city. The convention would not support a hotel for a month, he said.

Mr. Pearson suggested that a petition be presented to the commissioners asking that more licenses be granted in London.

Will Hold Joint Conference.

After considerable discussion a resolution was passed that a strong committee be appointed to confer with the other progressive associations in regard to securing more hotels.

The condition of the roads in that section of the city was also discussed. It was thought that the only remedy for present conditions was the imposition of a wheel tax on all vehicles in the city. Mr. Wakeling pointed out that to be effective the tax should apply to the whole of Ontario, as farmers coming into the city were just as much responsible for the cutting up of the roads as teamsters in the city.

Advocate Wheel Tax.

A resolution was moved that the city council be asked to lay the matter before the Provincial Legislature, and endeavor to secure a wheel tax for the whole of Ontario.

Automobiles should be made to pay a tax of at least \$25, as they are responsible for a great deal of damage to the roads, in the opinion of some of the members of the association.

A communication was read from the secretary of the Trades and Labor Council, asking support in an endeavor to secure a gymnasium for workmen in one of the buildings in Queen's Park. It was agreed to lend the support of the association to this project.

## ARE PREPARING PLANS FOR MUSIC BUILDING

New Buildings and Repairs for Queen's Park To Be Discussed Next Week.

Representatives of the Western Fair Board visited Queen's Park recently to inspect the buildings and to learn the repairs which will be necessary this year.

Secretary A. M. Hunt has been busy all week preparing a schedule of a number of meetings which are to be held next week, and which the question of a new music building for the exhibition grounds and the necessary repairs to the buildings will come up. Plans for the music building are being prepared and will be submitted to the board at its first meeting.

"The repair work on the buildings will be started as soon as possible," said Mr. A. M. Hunt, "and if the board decides to erect the music building work on it will be started as quickly as possible."

A FAREWELL PARTY

Friends of Mr. Upthegrove Gather to Bid Him Farewell.

The home of Mrs. Wm. Upthegrove, 750 Adelaide street, was the scene of a farewell dinner Thursday night, about 25 friends and neighbors being present to say farewell to Mr. Upthegrove, who leaves today for Windsor, where he had been transferred by the Canadian Pacific Railway.

After dinner cards were played and several solos and instrumentals were rendered by the guests. Mr. Upthegrove expects to be in Windsor for a year.

BOARDING-HOUSES NEEDED

Hundreds of Young Men Would Like to Obtain Quarters in Chelsea Green.

Chelsea Green is sadly in need of a couple of boarding-houses to give board to the young men who work in McClary's foundry, the rolling mills, and other factories in that section.

There are several hundred young men, who have no homes in this city, employed in those factories, and they have to go some distance from their work to obtain boarding-houses.

"Two good boarding-houses could make lots of money in this section," said Mr. J. Winslow. "We have dozens of inquiries for a boarding-house here every week, and if someone would only start one I feel sure that they would find it a profitable venture."
