GENERAL SIR SAM NICE TO SELF IN MODEST INTERVIEW

Taught Lawyers "I Won't
Take Puppism."

STICKS WITH ALLISON

Names Sir Wilfrid Laurier in
"Disreputable Little
Clique."

[Special to The Advertiser.]
TORONTO, June 22.—"Kind of hand-
ed out to them, didn't it?" quotes
General Sir Sam Hughes, minister of
militia, who spent this evening in To-
ronto, en route from London to Ottawa,
when asked concerning the recent in-
vestigations before Sir William Mer-
edith and Hon. Justice Duff, and Sir
Charles Davidson respectively. The
minister was well pleased with man-
ner in which he had handled cross-ex-
amination counsel at both investigations.
"Taught them," said he, "that I won't
take puppism from the Angel Gabriel."
"When do you expect the reports
from the commissions?" Sir Sam was
asked.

"Don't know and don't care," he re-
torted. "It's a matter of supreme im-
portance to me, mere puff, from start
to finish."

Sticks by Allison.
"You still stick by Allison?"
"Sam Hughes sticks by his friends,"
was the emphatic response. "Allison is
one of the biggest and best men in
Canada—and the cleanest, too. He has
saved the country thousands of dollars
and done splendid work. Allison has
earned credit for what he has done and
for the enemies and traducers he has
made. Who are they, this disreputable
little clique? Line them up and look
them over for yourself." Here General
Hughes enumerated the "traducers" of
himself and Allison.

Does Not Love These.
He named among others Sir Wilfrid
Laurier, F. B. Carvell, M.P., Stewart
Lyon, John Ross Robertson, John B.
Robinson and B. McNab, to each of
whom he paid his respects in pictur-
esque language.

Reverting to military matters, General
Hughes spoke in eulogistic terms of
the men in khaki whom he had inspec-
ted at Niagara and London camps, and
was enthusiastic over the prospects at
Borden Camp. Recruiting throughout
Canada and particularly in Quebec was,
he declared, "coming along in a most
satisfactory way."

Sees Self in Movies.

Sir Sam reached Toronto on his
special car with his personal staff late
in the afternoon. He was the guest of
a party of friends at the National Club
for dinner, and subsequently attended
a private production of the inspection
at London portrayed in rapidly develop-
ing "movies." He left for Ottawa via
Canadian Northern.

FRENCH AIRMEN SHELL 2 TOWNS EAST OF RHINE

Drop Bombs on Karlsruhe,
100 Miles From Nancy.

ALSO ATTACK MULHEIM

Fifty Shells Are Dropped On
the Military Works
There.

[Canadian Press Cable.]
PARIS, June 22.—An official state-
ment issued tonight contains the fol-
lowing regarding aviation:

"In reprisal for the successive bom-
bardments carried out by the Germans
the last few days on the open towns
of Bar-le-duc and Luneville, our aerial
squadrons have conducted several
operations in enemy territory. On the
night of June 21-22 eighteen shells were
dropped on the town of Treves, where
a great fire broke out. Today a flo-
w of nine aeroplanes dropped 40
shells on Karlsruhe (175 kilometres
from Nancy). Another group of ten
aeroplanes set out to bombard Mul-
heim (on the right bank of the Rhine).
Fifty shells were dropped on the mili-
tary establishments at that town.

Fight With Fokkers.

"Pursued by a squadron of fockers
on their return from Mulheim, our ma-
chines gave battle, in the course of
which a fock was brought down. One
of our machines was obliged to make
a landing by reason of motor trouble.

"In the course of the day our pursuit
aeroplanes likewise displayed activity.
Sub-Lieut. Nungesser brought down his
eighth aeroplane, which came to earth
at Lamorville in our wire entangle-
ments.

"To the south of Libona a German
aeroplane simultaneously subjected to
machine fire by Sergt. Chaintat and
Sub-Lieut. Guynemer, crashed to the
ground. Sergt. Chaintat had brought
down up to that day four aeroplanes;
Sub-Lieut. Guynemer nine.

"In the region of Elneville, north of
Luneville, an enemy aeroplane was
brought down by the fire of our arti-
llery.

"The two German aeroplanes which
fell yesterday morning to the north
of St. Michel and near Fort Genicourt,
were brought down by Sub-Lieut. Cha-
put, who had accounted for six enemy
machines up to that time."

SALONIKI FRONT BECOMING ACTIVE; BULGARS ADVANCE

Allied Airmen Give Pursuit
to German Aeroplanes.

PARIS, June 23—1:05 a.m.—A Havas
dispatch from Saloniki says that there
is intense activity of the artillery of
the central allies all along the front.
Engagements between the patrols are
increasing.

Extensive movements of the central
forces are reported between Trupa and
Osini.

Allied aeroplanes have bombarded
the Gumudjima-Veles camps. French
aeroplanes, the dispatch adds, drove
off three German machines which were
proceeding toward Saloniki.

The Bulgarians, the dispatch adds,
made some advance.

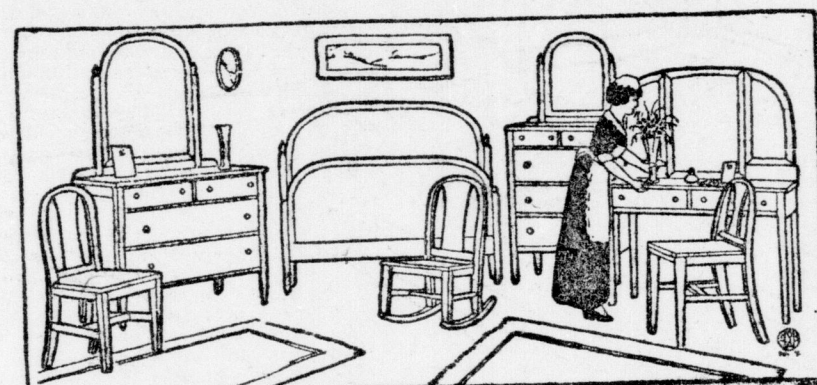
KICKED TO DEATH BY HORSE.

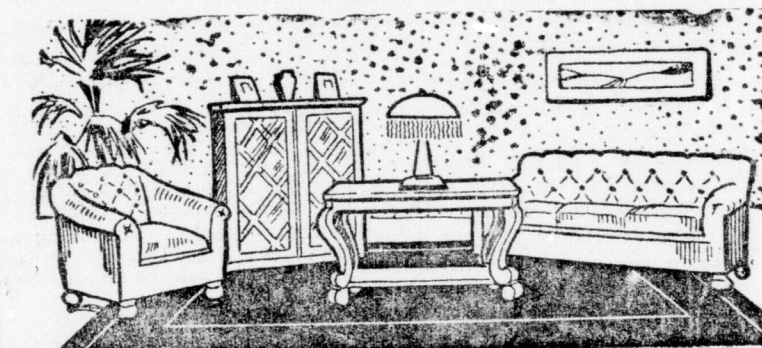

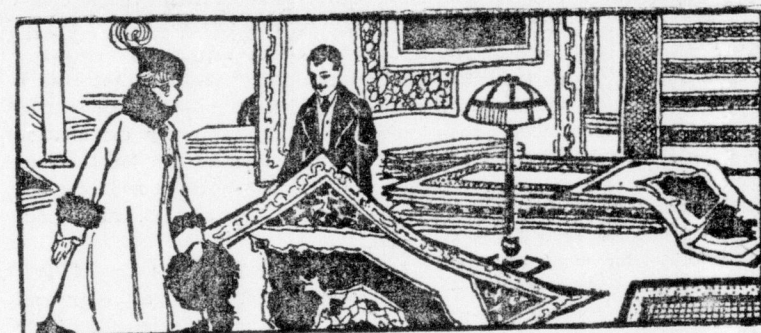

Snow Avalanche Covers Railway Many Feet Deep

Traffic in B. C. Tied Up—
Columbia River Rising
Rapidly.

REVELSTOCK, B.C., June 22.—A
great slide came down this morning and
piled a mantle of snow and debris on
the Arrowhead branch line of the C.
P. R. many feet deep, closing the line
to traffic. It is expected traffic will
be resumed tomorrow.

The water in the Columbia River here
is within a few feet of the 1894 record,
with prospects of a continual rise, owing
to hot weather. No through trains from
the west have arrived since Sunday.
Passengers were taken east via the
Arrow Lakes and Crow's Nest line to-
day. In the west flood conditions are
somewhat better.

ULTIMATUM FROM HYDRO ISSUED TO POWER CO.

Corporation Must Come to Terms or
Have Export License Cancelled.

TORONTO, June 22.—That the
Canadian Niagara Power Company will
have to come to reasonable terms with
the hydro-electric commission or stand
a chance of having its license to ex-
port power to the United States can-
celled, was the report obtained from a
semi-official source today.

The hydro-electric commission insists
that 50,000-horsepower be sold to it
by next December. Some 32,500-horse-
power has been offered by the company
at \$15 per horsepower. This price is re-
garded by the hydro as out of the ques-
tion. It is said that the company is
getting from \$20 to \$25 in the United
States.

CENTENARY OF FIRST MASS.
SHERBROOKE, P.Q., June 22.—The
first mass in the Eastern Townships
was said in the house of Mr. Felton,
the lower Belvidere road, 100 years ago,
and a four-days' fete in celebration of
this was begun today.

TRENCHES REGAINED IN GALLANT ATTACK BY WELSH FUSILIERS

LONDON, June 23.—12:16 a.m.—
A British official communication made
public at midnight says:

"Early this morning (Thursday) the
enemy exploded an exceptionally large
mine in the neighborhood of Givenchy,
just north of La Hassee Canal. The
explosion was followed by a hostile
bombardment of our trenches, under
cover of which the enemy entered our
trenches on a narrow front. Troops of
the Royal Welsh Fusiliers immediately
delivered a very gallant and successful
counter-attack, inflicting heavy losses
on the enemy and driving him com-
pletely out of our positions. Consider-
ing the size of the mine and the in-
tensity of the fire our total casualties
were comparatively light. Since then
the situation in this neighborhood has
been quiet.

"Farther south, during the night
(Wednesday) we exploded a mine in
the neighborhood of the Hohenzollern
reduit and occupied the lip of the
crater.

"Today (Thursday) passed quietly
everywhere. Southeast of Arrmentieres
our artillery was successful in silencing
enemy guns which were shelling
behind our lines near the Ploegsteert
wood.

"Yesterday (Wednesday) in the air
there was a marked decrease in activity
by the enemy, while our machines
carried out a great deal of successful
work in co-operation with the artill-
ery."

KOENIG DOCKS AT KIEL

Big German Battleship Damaged in
Jutland Fight.

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, June 22.—
Via London.—According to the Ribe-
stines-Tidende, the German battleship
Koenig, damaged in the naval battle of
May 31, has been docked at Kiel.

RAISE TAX ON INCOMES.
LONDON, June 22.—6:25 p.m.—The
House of Commons formally agreed to-
day to the resolution of Reginald Mc-
Kenna, chancellor of the exchequer,
imposing an additional income tax of
two shillings in the pound on income
derived from foreign investments.

Law in the Way of Appointment of Lloyd George

Prevents More Than Four
Principal Secretaries Be-
ing in Commons.

LONDON, June 23—3:19 a.m.—It has
just developed that the principal
reason for the delay in appointing
David Lloyd George to the war office
is a technical one. There exists a
statutory prohibition against the pres-
ence in the House of Commons of more
than four "principal secretaries of
state," and Mr. Lloyd George's ap-
pointment as Earl Kitchener's suc-
cessor would bring the number up to five.

The other members of the House of
Commons holding these high offices
are Sir Edward Grey, Andrew Bonar
Law, J. Austen Chamberlain and
Herbert L. Samuel.

Unless one of these ministers goes
to the House of Lords, a re-arrange-
ment of the cabinet offices or the
amendment of the act of 1853, which
contains the prohibition, will be neces-
sary before Mr. Lloyd George takes up
his new office.

GOVERNMENT TO PROVIDE MEN ARTIFICIAL LIMBS

Ottawa Warns People Against Peti-
tioners for Such Funds.

OTTAWA, June 22.—Funds to buy
artificial limbs for soldiers are being
solicited by certain people in different
parts of the country. The military
hospital commission says no attention
should be paid to such appeals.

"It cannot be too widely known,"
states that secretary, "that the most
ample provision is being made by the
Government for the latest and best
types of artificial limbs both in Canada
and in England for all members of the
forces who have suffered amputation.
A special factory is being established
in connection with the convalescent
home in Toronto for the manufacture
and fitting of artificial limbs."
