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# LOOK FOR BOMB-SHELLS ON WAR FINANCE PROBE

Ottawa Hears Startling Disclosure Due On Investigation.

A SPECIAL COMMITTEE

Whole Question of Civil Re-establishment Also To Be Gone Into.

**BULLETIN.**  
OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 7.—(By Canadian Press.)—The appointment of Hon. Hewitt Bostock, former Liberal Senate leader, as speaker of the Senate, was announced tonight.

[Special To London Advertiser.]  
OTTAWA, Feb. 7.—While the new government is working silently and maintaining a somewhat remarkable secrecy, there are well-founded rumors afloat of startling disclosures regarding the administration of certain departments of government during recent years.

It is understood, for instance, that the investigation held by the late government into the exploitation of exchange with respect to the provision for the payment of deferred soldiers' allowances and into the recasting of unregistered Victory Bonds, coupons have both touched the edge of financial malpractice, which have existed, further investigations are said to be proceeding under the new government, and further startling disclosures are anticipated.

**Great Sums Involved.**  
During the war years Canada's finance department collected, borrowed and disbursed more money than in the number of years in pre-war days. Loans to a total of two billion dollars were floated, and the work of administering these was great. Currency was inflated and there were heavy extra issues of Dominion bank notes. New direct taxes were inaugurated, and for the collection of excess profits and income taxes new machinery had to be provided.

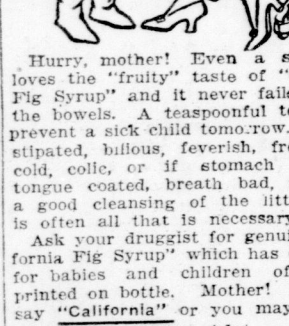
It would appear that the supervision in none of these new activities was as efficient as it should have been.

**Some May Be Recovered.**  
In connection with the administration of the income and excess profits taxes the best that can be said is that a very wide discretion was exercised, as a result of which it is freely rumored the treasury lost millions of dollars. Some may yet be recovered, a good deal may not.

One former official of the finance department is in the penitentiary today because of the manipulation of Victory Bonds coupons. The loss to

# To Petition Censor Board to Ban "Queen of Sheba" Film

General Ministerial Association Shocked At Misinterpretation of Bible Story—Also Seek Change in Race-track Gambling Law.

TORONTO, Feb. 7.—In an attempt to prevent the further exhibition in Ontario of the film called "The Queen of Sheba," the General Ministerial Association here, on the motion of Rev. Lawrence Skye and Rev. Ronald McLead, have decided to petition the board of censors.

"It was monstrous," was the way Mr. Skye summarized his impression of the film version of the Bible story to the assembled ministers at the Central Y. M. C. A. last evening. "Abominable" was another strong word he used to describe this super-film. Mr. Skye, who confessed he liked good "movies," told of a visit he had made with his wife to see the play in question. The whole Bible story was distorted, he declared, and the only interpretation that people, especially those who had never read the story in the Bible, could take away with them, said Mr. Skye, would be that God almost encouraged immorality, and that the story of the censor was carried unanimously.

**Re-establishment Problems.**  
Shortly after Parliament meets next month it is expected that the government will announce its intention to appoint a committee representative of all three parties in the House of Commons, which body will be required to investigate the whole matter of soldiers' civil re-establishment, and recommend whatever changes it may find necessary in the existing legislation.

From the indications which have already been given, it is understood that this committee will be given practically a free hand in the matter of where it begins and ends its probe, but that it will also take into consideration much of the evidence taken before the committee which sat during the preceding sessions of Parliament.

**Liberal Organizer Resigns.**  
The resignation of Andrew Haydon from the position of secretary and chief organizer of the Liberal party will take place on March 3. Mr. Haydon desires to devote his entire attention to the law practice. It is understood that the two positions will be separated, and that two persons will be appointed to succeed Mr. Haydon. Among names mentioned are those of W. T. R. Preston of Port Hope, E. Roy Sayles, W. H. Adams, A. H. Beeston, Fred Rose, J. D. Ramsden and J. D. Peck of Toronto, Wilfred Grace, C. M. Goddard, E. R. Jackson and Ewer Lyon of Ottawa, and W. A. Stewart of Cornwall.

# MAY ALTER TIME POPE'S ELECTION

ROME, Feb. 7.—Prolongation of the time—now ten days—between the demise of the pope and the date of convening the Sacred College for the election of a new pope to a period not yet definitely decided upon, but which will permit Canada, the United States and South America to be represented, is the first question which will be discussed at the first consistory called by Pius XI.

Cardinal Lucon, Archbishop of Rheims, is sponsor for the proposal. The Sacred College in general has felt deeply that the announcement of the election of the American cardinals might be interpreted in their country as a slight.

The pope has confirmed the appointment of Cardinal Gasparri as papal secretary of state, and the prelates forming the pontifical court of Benedict XV.

**TOWNSHIP TO PAY FOR OWN FIRE PROTECTION**  
WINDSOR, Feb. 7.—If townships want fire protection from Windsor they must in future pay for it. The fire committee of the council took this action tonight as result of numerous complaints from tax payers that the city's expensive apparatus had been damaged by being driven at a fast speed over bad roads.

It cost the city approximately \$5,000 last year to fight fires outside the city limits, members of the committee said.

Opinion is general that the sale will be sanctioned either at tomorrow's meeting or at one to be held row's meeting after, but there is every indication that there will be some stormy seas to weather before the vote is taken. Up till noon hour today the management of the bank had secured proxies from holders to the approximate number of 84,000 shares. To make the necessary two-thirds majority 70,000 shares only are needed. To Scrutinize Carefully. The meeting is scheduled to start at 3 o'clock, but it may be some time later before it commences, due to the fact that a large attendance of shareholders is expected, and it will take time to scrutinize and issue

# FISHERMEN ARE RESCUED FROM ERIE ICE FLOE

Carried Far Out in Lake When Strong Off-Shore Wind Blows.

BOAT GIVES SHEET CHASE

Five Port Stanley Men Marooned When Mile From Beach.

[Special To London Advertiser.]  
PORT STANLEY, Feb. 7.—When a wind from off the shore played havoc with the icefield binding Port Stanley, five fishermen were swept out in Lake Erie on a floe of ice late Tuesday afternoon, and were saved with a great deal of difficulty. George Moore, sr.; George Moore, jr.; William Gregory, Earl Stacey and Harry Butcher, all of this village, were fishing through holes in the ice about a mile from the shore when a strong wind blew from the north. Without warning the icefield started to shift, and the portion on which the five men were working drifted out into the open water. Their predicament after a time was noticed from the shore, and a lifeboat was loaded onto a sleigh which was being used to haul ice out on the harbor, and taken to the edge of the icefield, where it was launched. A crew captained by Walter Brown, manned the boat, and after a hard row reached the men, who were suffering little from their experience.

# CONTRACT FOR ICE BREAKER IS CANCELLED

Government Take Action Which Will Save \$1,000,000.

WILL PURCHASE VESSEL

OTTAWA, Feb. 7.—(By Canadian Press.)—The contract for the construction of an ice-breaker, awarded to the Canadian Vickers, Limited, in November last, and signed by the minister of marine and fisheries on Dec. 14, 1921, has been ordered cancelled, and the government, it is stated by officials of the marine and fisheries department, will thereby save over \$1,000,000.

Instead of constructing the new vessel, the government has authorized the purchase of the ice-breaker John D. Hazen, which was sold in an unfinished condition to the Russian government, but which got no further on her way to Russian than Cherbourg, France, from where she is to be returned to Canada.

The John D. Hazen was bought for \$250,000. Lloyds Agency reported the ice-breaker in first-class condition and worth \$205,000. The ice-breaker to be built by Vickers, Limited, was to cost \$1,850,000.

**Duncan Marshall Appointed.**  
Hon. Duncan Marshall, former minister of agriculture for Manitoba, has been appointed commissioner of agriculture for the federal agricultural department, it was officially announced tonight. Mr. Marshall unsuccessfully contested the East Canby seat as a Liberal candidate in the recent general election.

Special provision for the relief of unemployed returned soldiers and their dependents in Montreal and some other points where distress conditions are such that they were not adequately met by the provisions of the relief ordinance passed on Jan. 26, have been made by the government, it was announced here tonight.

# STILL WANT HAY TO LEAD LIBERALS

TORONTO, Feb. 7.—Liberal members of the Legislature today held a caucus in the parliament buildings, the proceedings lasting several hours. It was decided that Wellington Hay, who was elected to the Ontario Liberal caucus, will continue to act for at least a few weeks after the opening of the Legislature next week.

The North Perth member is said to have adhered to his former expressed decision not to accept the post as a permanent one. The unanimous decision of the caucus was to ask Mr. Hay to continue to act until the Ontario Liberal Convention, which will be held in Toronto March 1 and 2.

It was announced today that the committee appointed in connection with arrangements for the convention held a meeting today at the offices of the Ontario Liberal executive and that it had already received from many ridings the names of their full quota of delegates, although the returns are not required to be sent in before Feb. 15. Indications were said to point to a successful convention.

# DENIES CALL TO POLICE WOULD BRING WHISKEY

Chief Slein of Brantford States He Did Not Influence Court

ROYAL COMMISSION SITS

Inspects Station Strong Room From Which Evidence in Case Disappeared.

[Special To London Advertiser.]  
BRANTFORD, Feb. 7.—Walter Gregory, commissioner of Toronto, came promptly at 10:30 o'clock this morning and announced himself in readiness to carry on with the police probe. Counsel present included John Jennings, K.C., of Toronto, and W. Ross MacDonald of this city, representing the city of Brantford; Frank Hughes, K.C., of Toronto, representing in a general sense, the department; W. S. Brewster, K.C., of this city, representing Police Magistrate W. C. Livingston.

William C. Coe, C.S.R., of Toronto, as secretary of the commission, was on hand to take a shorthand report of the whole inquiry. Chief of Police Charles Slein was the first witness to be examined when the probe commenced. Questioned by Mr. Jennings, Chief Slein related in detail facts concerning his department's activities in the suppression of crime in the city. He denied emphatically that he had used his position as chief of police to influence court business in any way for the benefit of either of his sons, in response to a query by Jennings.

**Reports Not Confirmed.**  
In connection with unsuccessful police raids on places marked for police prosecution, Chief Slein testified that police officers on his staff had informed him of their belief that these proposed activities had been "tipped off" by Louis Stander, court interpreter. Chief Slein had investigated these complaints and had found them groundless, as far as he was able to discover.

Previous to the recommendation, this afternoon, Commissioner Gregory paid a visit of inspection to the police station and examined the premises, paying particular attention to the construction of the strong room, from which "Exhibit 6" disappeared and because of which three officers of the force were temporarily suspended. When questioned as to the honesty and integrity of the three suspended officers, Detective Inspector James Chapman, Detective Chief Constable Stewart, Chief Slein said that he believed them all to have been excellent officers, and he had no complaints to make against any of them.

**Thought Men Efficient.**  
They were all competent and efficient officers, he thought. They had been suspended since November. Witness had met them frequently, sometimes in the police station and again on the street.

Witness could not remember whether the magistrate had taken part in any of the consultations. None of these had taken place in the magistrate's house, nor in the house of Detective Schuler or the witness's home, Chief Slein stated positively. Questioned as to the discipline of his force, Chief Slein said it was good.

Witness said that he was on duty sometimes day and night both. He declared positively that he had never known of any liquor being taken from the police station.

"Did you ever hear that it is said that the easiest way to get liquor in town is to telephone the police station?" asked Mr. Jennings.

"No," replied the chief, emphatically.

# SANCTION CHURCH UNION PLANS

TORONTO, Feb. 7.—Toronto Presbytery today by a practically unanimous vote sanctioned a plan drawn up and presented by a joint-committee on co-operation for the amalgamation of thirty Methodist and Presbyterian rural congregations within the presbytery.

The congregations affected will be allowed to endorse or reject the plan. Of the churches to be merged eleven are Presbyterian and nineteen are Methodist. In the Woodbridge-Bolton section the Methodists gain fifteen families and four members and lose \$150 in stipends; in the Queensville-Sutton section the Presbyterians gain 16 families and 38 members and gain \$15 in stipends. The union is planned to become effective about July.

In commenting on the union plan, Rev. Dr. Chown, superintendent of the Methodist Church, said: "It is quite in harmony with the larger union, which is to take place in the near future. It saves the church from the waste in both men and money and the church itself, as an institution, has a much larger public influence."

# FIRE WIPES OUT YUKON LANDMARK

DAWSON CITY, Y. T., Feb. 7.—(By Canadian Press.)—Fire last night destroyed the Empire Block, one of Dawson's landmarks. The building was originally valued at \$50,000. The firemen had to fight the fire in a temperature of 50 degrees below zero.
