STAGES BATTLE**Secretary Burke Describes Op-
ponents As "Reds" and
"Disruptionists."**MOULD MAKES REPLY**

The last hour and a half of last night's meeting of the Trades and Labor Council developed into a heated battle between Delegates Arthur Mould and J. F. Thompson on one side and Secretary Burke on the other. In which unparliamentary language was often employed. It was adjourned at 11 p.m. as the secretary was speaking, only on the assurance of all the delegates in attendance that the matter would certainly be continued and fought to a finish at the next meeting of the council.

After a quiet evening in which there was no hint of the impending flood of eloquence and personality, J. F. Thompson rose at 9:25 to speak on a point of privilege and to read a letter which had been written by Secretary Burke to S. F. Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor, dated July 6th, in which he made the following statements: "That in order to stop the red elements in the London Trades and Labor Council from gaining control I wish to call attention to the fact that the council is in danger of being 'disrupted.' The latter stated that Arthur Mould 'is an employer of labor, was never a member of any craft union, and that many local unions had left the council on account of the 'red' activities of these two men. The letter also stated that during the war Mould and Thompson, together with their friends, had used the funds of the council to start a labor temple."

Thompson Asks Apology.
In comment, Delegate Thompson asked that the secretary be requested to repudiate his letter. "Why," he said, "I don't suppose Delegate Burke knows what a 'red' is. In any case," he added, "all this is only politics, and I take it as a great credit that a man who uses the same language as E. S. Little and C. P. Somerville, those kind friends of labor, should attack me. If Brother Burke had tried very hard to find the facts he would have discovered that Mould was a member of a craft union, 'As for me,' he went on, 'I have nothing to be ashamed of. I had four sons in the war and four daughters doing war work. I went through the same marine area twice with horses, and my standing as a labor man should be assured when I say that I have served four times as secretary of my union.'"

Mould Starts Attack.
Arthur Mould, in speaking for himself, though constantly interrupted by Delegate Young, said: "I have been told on reliable authority that the same men who are the political friends of the Secretary Burke have promised that unless I left the labor movement they would put the financial skids under me, and they have done their best so far. 'I am a labor man because I believe in it and because it is my religion, and I did not join the union'
