LABOR COUNCIL

Secretary Burke Describes Opponents As "Reds" and "Disruptionists."

MOULD MAKES REPLY

The last hour and a half of last night's meeting of the Trades and abor Council developed into a heated battle between Delegates Arthur fould and J. F. Thompson on one side and Secretary Burke on the ther, in which unparliamentary anguage was often employed. It other, in which unparliamentary language was often employed. It was adjourned at 11 p.m. as the secretary was speaking, only on the assurance of all the delegates in attendance that the matter would certainly be continued and fought to a finish at the next meeting of the council.

After a quiet evening in which there was no hint of the impending flood of eloquence and personality, J. F. Thompson rose at 9:25 to speak on a point of privilege and to read a letter which had been written by Secretary Burke to S. F. Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor, dated July 6th, in which he made the following statements: "That in order to stop the red elements in the London Trades and Labor Council from gaining control I wish a ruling as to whether Arthur Mould and J. F. Thompson have a right to be members of the Federation, as unless something is done the council is in danger of being disrupted." The latter stated that Arthur Mould "is an employer of labor, was never a member of any craft union, and that many local unions had left the council on account of the 'red' activities of these tracers." union, and that many local unions had left the council on account of the 'red' activities of these two men. The letter also stated that during the war Mould and Thompson, together with their friends, had used the funds of the council to start a labor temple. Thompson Asks Apology.

In comment, Delegate Thompson asked that the secretary be requested to repudiate his letter. "Why," he said, "I don't suppose Delegate Burke knows what a "red" is. "In any case," he added, "all this is only politics, and I take it as a great credit that a man who uses the same language as E. S. Little and C. R. Somerville, those kind friends of labor, should attack me. If Brother Burke had tried very hard to find the facts he would have discovered that Mould tried very hard to find the facts he would have discovered that Mould was a member of a craft union. "As for me," he went on, "I have nothing to be ashamed of. I had four sons in the war and four daughters doing war work. I went through the submarine area twice with horses, and my standing as a labor man should my standing as a labor man should be assured when I say that I have served four times as secretary of my Mould Starts Attack.

Arthur Mould, in speaking for himself, though constantly interrupted by Delegate Young, said: "I have been told on reliable authority that the same men who are the political friends of Secretary Burke have promised that unless I left the labor movement they would put the financial skids under me, and they have done their best so far. cial skids under me, and they have done their best so far. "I am a labor man because I be-lieve in it and because it is my re-ligion, and I did not join the union

because I was afraid of the government, as he says. When the secretary says that I and my friends took the funds of the labor movement to build a labor temple my answer is that a committee was formed to rent this building with the funds collected, and that the committee was composed of Frank McKay, John Cummings, Jack McGuire, R. H. Hessell, A. F. Vining, J. Hill H. Lediet, W. Ballard and myself. Are these men all dangerous 'Reds'?"

In conclusion Mr. Mould said, "There is no man who can say to me on the street that I have sheltered behind my wife and children by joining the labor movement, and I say distinctly to Secretary Burke that he is a liar." Burke Counter-Attacks.

The secretary in replying to this joint attack owned that he had written the letter, but said that he saw nothing wrong with it. "I think that has been made president. Mould and Thompson are 'Reds,' he declared, "because they are friends of Jimmy Simpson, Malcolm Bruce and MacDonald in Toronto, and they are all Bolshevists. I believe that they want to produce the same conditions here as are in vogue in Russia today. As for Thompson, to my knowledge he never worked at anything, and the status of both these men has been questioned by a large number of men in the city for some

There was a great deal of comment and interruption all through the dis-cussion, Delegate Linnell being in-sistent on the rights of Thompson and Mould, and Fred Young being equally insistent as to the correctness of the secretary. Eleven o'clock struck while Secretary Burke was speaking, and the meeting was adjourned, in accordance with the constitution of the council. There were strenuous assurances on all sides that the question would never rest until it was settled in some way.
