

## MANY ASPIRE TO DIRECT COUE'S NEW INSTITUTION

Prominent Women in New York Wage Bitter Struggle  
—Simple Old Frenchman Called in to Settle  
Question of Appointing Head Himself.

### SELECTS MARCHESA MANNUCCI CAPONI

New York, Jan. 8.—The first Sunday in the United States of M. Emile Coue, although planned as a day of relaxation from the activities which have characterized the first three days of his visit, developed into perhaps the most important of his entire trip. The incident, explosion on the part of the prominent women in this city who have been aspirants for the honor of being named director of the Coue Institute here, when it is established, was straightened out only after the simple old Frenchman himself had been brought in to settle the matter.

All of the women members of the committee conducting M. Coue's lecture tour to this country, who have been pushing forward their own candidates for the position at the head of the proposed clinic, were brought together in the drawing-room of a private home in this city and made to thrash out their differences. M. Coue himself then was brought before them, and smilingly, without any apparent realization of the depths of bitterness and rivalry aroused by the controversy over who will be his first disciple here, told the women his wishes.

As a result of the "peace conference" today, the Marchesa Mannucci Caponi, American-born, widow of an Italian, won a long fight. M. Coue stated simply that he had planned to place her in charge of the clinic when it is opened here, and that he still wishes her to be the director.

Faced by the simple Frenchman, almost childishly ignorant of the dangerous proportions to which the controversy had grown, the women all agreed at once, and a little sheepishly, to abide by his wishes and to sink their own differences "for the cause." M. Coue was brought to this city to promote the use of his "hypnotic" method, and to unwind the tangle of emotional women candidates only as a last resort. It was feared that unless he left his wishes known in person, the rivalry might grow to such proportions as to injure the whole purpose of his mission to this country—the teaching of the ill how to heal themselves through auto-suggestion.

## LAVERGNE MAY SEEK CONSERVATIVE SEAT

Turns From Nationalist Ranks  
Following Break With  
Henri Bourassa.

### MAY RUN IN QUEBEC

His Former Leader Indignantly  
Refutes Claim Party Is  
Dead.

Quebec, Jan. 7.—The report that Armand Lavergne is to run in Quebec East under the auspices of the Conservative party, and that this means the final break with his former chief, Henri Bourassa, leader of the so-called Nationalist party, has caused much comment.

Lavergne, seen today by The Advertiser representative, admitted that he has been solicited by his former adversaries to enter their ranks and run in the old division of Quebec East, which was Sir Wilfrid's during his premiership in Ottawa.

Asked whether the Nationalist party would not be offended by the sight of one of its principal adherents falling into the possession of the enemy, so to speak, he replied, meditatively, that the Nationalist party was a thing of the past. It was known that since the last federal election Bourassa and Lavergne have been on terms of friendship. It is true that the Nationalist attended a banquet here in Quebec tendered to his lieutenant after his defeat in Quebec county.

Bourassa Replies.  
That was in January, 1922. At the banquet, Bourassa became indignant when one of the speakers intimated that Nationalism was dead. He retorted that it was not perhaps as active as it had been, but it was quite true that Nationalist candidates were not taking part officially in electoral campaigns; but he claimed that the influence exercised by the Nationalists, not only in Quebec, but the whole Dominion, began here today of the general election, and that no one would dare attack them as they had been attacked once, and the French-Canadian would never crawl down, as they might have done, before such influence had been created.

This was Lavergne's contention, also, today. He claimed that before the Nationalists had organized their movement, they had succeeded in changing the mentality of the people, and in improving the political standard of their compatriots.

Evidently Lavergne would not state that Bourassa was indignant against his own natural bent for his political activity, but he admitted that he might have been under the opportunity of entering the field under the banner of Nationalism.

Became Conservative.  
Ten years ago the Province of Quebec was impregnated with the spirit of Nationalism. In 1911, Bourassa and Lavergne succeeded in operating 27 representatives from this province into the federal parliament. After their arrival there, Lavergne claimed that they did not keep their promises. They became Conservatives, in fact.

When the school question came up in the West, identical to that which had caused the break of Bourassa and Laurier's friendship ten years before, Lavergne contends that the men they had helped to elect betrayed them.

This inconsistency on the part of these men brought the downfall of the Nationalist party. Since then, from time to time, the name of Bourassa has been mentioned as a candidate in the elections. His close friends admit that the master has been tempted on many occasions to go into the field, but that his disillusion, he claims, in the political sphere, he returns every time to his Journalism.

Lavergne Active.  
On the other hand, he has been more active. He has been a candidate in the past elections as a Liberal or a Progressive. In the latter because he could not endorse the Conservative platform, which had enforced conscription, to which he had been openly opposed.

And he would not be a Liberal, because he claimed they were just as guilty as the Conservatives in the conscription and execution of the war measures.

It was known, however, that he was backed by the Conservatives. Now he has been invited to attend the opening of the Conservative campaign in Quebec at the Saucy banquet on Tuesday. On his presence there will depend whether or not he will run in Quebec East.

His relations with the Liberals have been of such a nature that after being a member of the Quebec Reform Club, a Liberal organization, he was now admitted to be an absolute enemy of Liberalism by the local Tories.

He has been responsible to a certain extent for the attacks made on the government regarding the Garneau affair.

He is John H. Roberts' attorney, and as such took occasion to demonstrate his violent antipathy to everything connected with the provincial government. In the past, Lavergne used to consult Bourassa when he proposed taking any important step in politics, but now the two men hardly talk to each other at all. In fact, there is no semblance of sympathy existing between them.

Dead Politically.  
In regard to influence of Nationalism on the people today, there still remains in colleges, and amongst the clergy, a taint of it which manifests itself from time to time, especially in the local clerical organ, L'Action Catholique. The Jesuits in the province are known to hold Bourassa's theories in high esteem, but as a practical system of politics Nationalism has lost its hold on the popular imagination. During the forthcoming election it is safe to say that not a single candidate will take the lists under that banner, which may be regarded as a vindication of the statement.

Even in the rural districts the fact that Laurier was defeated by the alliance of the Nationalists with the Conservatives in the province in 1911 is not forgotten, and all the war measures which were so repugnant to the popular mind have become insignificant in comparison with the remembrance of that ever-salient fact.
