Edmonton, Alta., Feb. 2 .- "I think we can get a wheat board this year." stated Premier Greenfield today, when asked as to the prospects in this regard. 

Preliminary Hearing of William McClarty Opens at Stratford This Afternoon.

CREATES SENSATION

Mother Superior of St. Joseph's Convent, Hamilton, Called as Witness.

Stratford, Feb. 2.-With the mother superior of the St. Joseph's Convent, Hamilton, and sisters in charge of Loretto Academy, Hamilton, subpoenaed to appear as witnesses, the preliminary hearing of William Mg-Clarty, charged with the abduction of his two children, will be held here this afternoon before Magistrate J. A. Makins.

This is a most peculiar case. It began with a Protestant wife laying a charge of abduction, an unusual charge, against her husband when he and their two children had been absent from home for a few hours.

It involves an application to the attorney-general's department to over-rule local crown attorney's refusal of bail and an appeal to appellate court that the case be not tried before county magistrate, and that it be changed from a criminal charge to civil action.
