


Searching for arms in the streets of Dublin. A passenger in a jaunting car being examined.

Dinosaurs at a drinking fountain, done in snow and ice at Davos, Switzerland.




This woman, Miss Parnell of Chelsea, London, England, is said to earn \$10,000 a year by modeling.









Pupils of the Kittredge school of athletics in New York, who swim to music.
