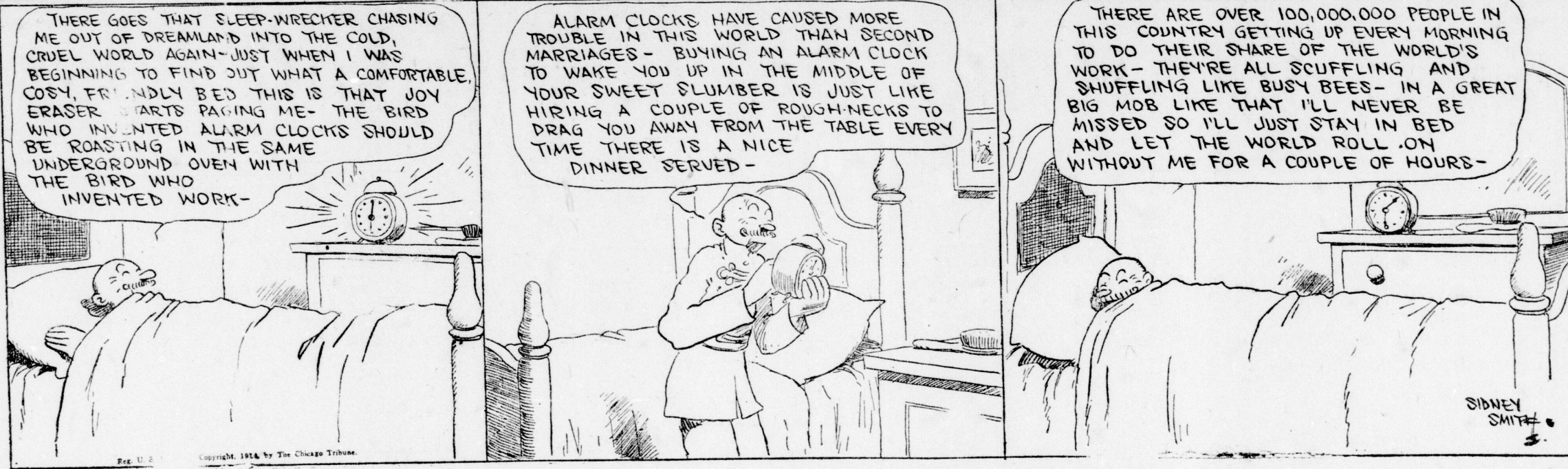

BARN AND CROPS LOST
IN BLAZE IN CARADOC

Large Building and Contents
On Farm of Peter Mac-
Dougall Burned.

Straithroy, Nov. 20.—Fire late this evening completely destroyed a large bank barn, together with the season's crops, on the farm of Peter MacDougall, lot 12, concession 6, Caradoc township.

The flames were first noticed coming out around the peak of the barn by Mr. Whiting, whose farm is about half a mile distant. He immediately notified Mr. MacDougall, who was at the supper table. A large number of neighbors soon gathered, but could do nothing other than prevent the flames from getting at a smaller barn and a shed nearby.

No livestock was in the building at the time of the fire, which is thought to have been caused by spontaneous combustion. The loss is estimated at \$5,000, and is partly covered by insurance.
