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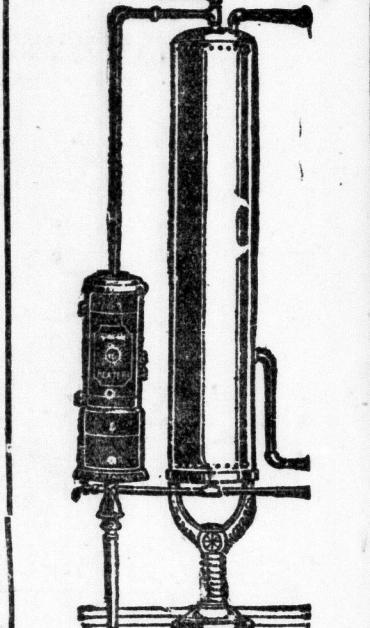

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WARFARE IN SYRIA SPREADS RAPIDLY

Guerrilla Fighting North of Damascus Shaking French Control.

Associated Press Despatch. London, Nov. 2.—A message from Jerusalem to the National Political League says that guerrilla warfare has spread over vast areas in Syria between Damascus and Homs, 50 miles north of Damascus on the railroad, and is shaking French control of the mandated region.

Another message says that eleven villages in the Damascus district have joined the guerrillas who are besieging four towns. Jerusalem reports also say that foreigners and native women are leaving Damascus by thousands, but that native men are forbidden to leave.

One despatch reiterates the report that 1,200 prisoners were killed at Damascus when, following a revolt in the prison, the French bombarded it.

The message to the National Political League states that the Arabs of Palestine struck work today, the anniversary of the Balfour declaration of 1917, as a protest against the events at Damascus. (The Balfour declaration said that "His Majesty's government view with favor the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people.")

Associated Press Despatch. Paris, Nov. 2.—The passage of Turkish troops across Syria, reported by English newspapers, was said in diplomatic circles today to be effected in accord with agreements previously reached between the French and Turkish governments. The situation contains no elements of tension, it was added.

The explanation was made that the Turkish forces in the usual course of their journey to Mesopotamia have no other way but to cross the territory held under French mandate.

WINNIPEG MEMBER WANTS GROUP GOVT

Says Labor Always Independent Enough To Vote On Merits.

Canadian Press Despatch. Winnipeg, Nov. 2.—"Labor's position will be in the future as in the past—absolutely independent," said J. S. Woodsworth, Labor member-elect for Center Winnipeg, today. "We shall try and vote on the merits of questions as they arise. Our support of any government measure will depend solely on the merits of the measure."

Mr. Woodsworth suggested that as a result of the present anomalous situation, a government representative of all groups in parliament should be forced to administer the affairs of the country.

JAMES LOUGHEED, SENATOR, TO BE BURIED AT CALGARY

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, Nov. 2.—The funeral of James Lougheed, Conservative leader, who died here this morning, will be held at Calgary, Alta., where he has lived since 1885. A funeral service will be held at All Saints' church on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, following which the body will be shipped to Calgary.

DEFERS ACTION TO APPOINT FIRE CHIEF AT WALKERVILLE

Windsor, Nov. 2.—Action regarding the appointment of a chief for the Walkerville fire department was deferred this afternoon at the regular meeting of the fire commission at Willistead Park. Several applications were read and placed with the others, who had been received previously, for future consideration.

Broadcast Life and Death Message To Northern Posts

American Station Will Attempt To Get Wireless Message Through Ordering Two Outlying Posts To Relief of Less Fortunate Neighbor.

HUDSON BAY COMPANY MEN STARVING

Associated Press Despatch. Boston, Mass., Nov. 2.—A radio message that may mean life or death in an isolated trapping and hunting post in the far north was injected into a broadcasting station at Springfield, tonight. Tomorrow night the ether will again be set quivering with the appeal which, it is hoped, may penetrate the distant Hudson Bay Company on Southampton Island.

Wednesday night the message will be repeated. The company's relief ship, laden with provisions, failed to reach the lonely post during the short Arctic summer.

A telegram requesting the following broadcast was received at W. B. Z. today:

"The following message is for Hudson Bay Company at Chesterfield Inlet, Repulse Bay, and Wager Inlet:

"The company's relief ship failed to reach Southampton Island this season. Consequently that post is insufficiently supplied with provisions. If Chesterfield Inlet or Wager Inlet receive this message, rush special courier to Repulse Bay and have forwarded from there to Southampton Island two sledloads of staple food, advising Southampton to draw on Repulse Bay where stocks are plentiful for further requirements. Should Repulse Bay receive this message, act on it at once without waiting to hear from Chesterfield or Wager Inlets."

(Signed)—Hudson Bay Company, Montreal, Canada.

More than a year ago the company equipped many of its posts scattered through the Arctic with radio receiving sets for the reception of messages, which otherwise would take months to deliver and for the entertainment of trappers during the long winter nights.

Reception conditions in these barren land, particularly from W. B. Z., have been excellent, it is noted in the logs kept at these northern stations. Already, on several occasions, sets have proven priceless to trappers otherwise cut off from the world and have made possible transmission of "life and death" messages.

The company has only one other means for getting relief to Southampton post, and that is by despatching a courier by dog sled into the north.

TRAFFIC CONTROL PLANS ARE MADE

Several Street Intersections Specified by Committee As Stop Points.

Special to The Advertiser. St. Thomas, Nov. 2.—The question of stop streets versus slow signs was again up for discussion at No. 1 committee this evening. The argument hinged on whether a stop sign at intersections on Talbot street would make of it a through traffic street, or a "race course," as Alderman Webster expressed it.

The council is very evenly divided on the question, Chairman McIntyre being firm in his opinion that the slow signs were serving the purpose well. Ald. Harding and Ald. Stokes favored the introduction of a stop sign at intersections, whose duty it would be to educate the people along this line. It seems that the department of public highways advocates the stopping of traffic before entering a main highway.

WOODSTOCK-INGERSOLL BUSES BEGIN SERVICE

New Lines Instituted Without the Ceremonies of Bygone Years.

Woodstock, Nov. 2.—The new Woodstock-Ingersoll buses started operations today, succeeding the trolley cars operated by the Woodstock-Ingersoll and Thames Valley electric railway, which ceased operations on Saturday night. The old trolley car service comes to an end after nearly a quarter of a century of service between this city and Ingersoll.

Although the start of the new bus service was made without ceremony, such was not the case on the 17th of June 1901, when the first street car was driven over the then new tracks between here and Ingersoll. The journey of the first car which left the powerhouse here was in charge of Conductor Burns and driven by Motorman Warfield and they had as their first passengers Judge Wallace, member of the city council, many prominent citizens and a number of newspapermen.

RESULTS IN PEACE RIVER UNCHANGED AT LATE HOUR

Canadian Press Despatch. Edmonton, Nov. 2.—Compilation of election returns in the Peace River riding this afternoon, with 220 polls heard from out of a total of 280, indicate that the election of Collins, Conservative, over Rae, Liberal, and Kennedy, Progressive, is practically assured. More than 50 belated polls were heard from during this morning and these did not lessen Collins' lead.

The total this afternoon from 220 polls was as follows: Collins, 3,721; Rae, 3,430; Kennedy, 3,332.

HAS UNDOUBTED RIGHT TO AWAIT PARLIAMENT

Toronto, Nov. 2.—The Toronto Star says it is Premier King's "undoubted right" to await parliament and challenge a decision there, and adds: "It is even more than a right, for it is a constitutional duty. PRESS CONFERENCE URGED 6-CENT RATE

Promotion of Further Inter-Imperial Trade Accomplished by Parley.

Canadian Press Despatch. Vancouver, B.C., Nov. 2.—Much toward the promotion of further inter-imperial trade and sympathy was accomplished by the Imperial Press conference in Australia, according to J. H. Woods, president of the Canadian Press and managing-director of the Calgary Herald, who returned Sunday, coming by way of San Francisco. Every courtesy was extended to the 47 delegates, seven of whom were Canadians. They travelled some 700 miles in New Zealand and approximately 3,500 miles in Australia. They were accorded every facility for seeing the countries and absorbing knowledge of their potentialities and development. Throughout the conference government officials were with them, as well as leading newspapermen, to explain the country. "As for the conference itself," said Mr. Woods, "it probably was the most successful of any yet held. There were representatives from Great Britain, Canada, New Zealand, South Africa, India, Malta, the Straits Settlement, Rangoon, as well as Australia. "The conference took definite steps to urge on the cable board of Great Britain a six-cent rate for the dissemination of news, a most important

step which, I believe, will be well received. "Another subject of importance with which the conference dealt was toward the consolidation of the use and control of the radio in connection with the press. In light of the rapid development of this great new force, it is bound to have a natural influence on cable rates."

GROUNDING SHIP FLOATED, HULL BADLY CRUMPLED

Associated Press Despatch. Calumet, Mich., Nov. 2.—The steamer Charles H. Hutchinson which grounded on Manitowish Island last Friday night, was floated today by wrecking tugs, and is being towed to Duluth. The vessel's bottom was badly damaged, and her hull crumpled.

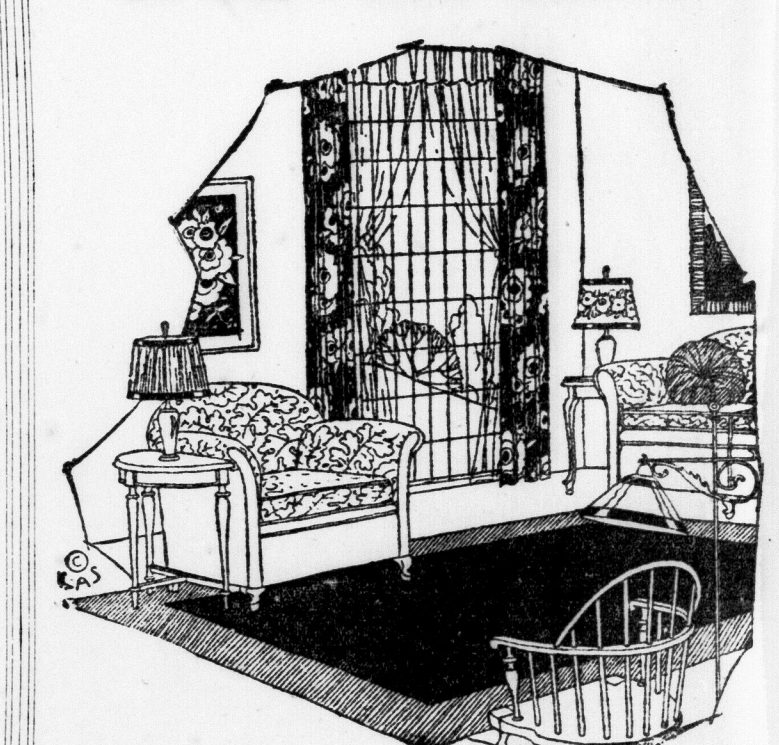
