



ADVISES PROSECUTORS TO STUDY ACT CLOSELY

Bayly Recommends Against Court Action Unless Law Deliberately Violated.

Toronto, July 31 .- Edward Bayly, K.C., deputy attorney-general of On-tarie, has written the following letter to the crown attorney's office of the province regarding the betting information act and prohibitory amendments to the criminal code:
"Dear Sir,—Most newspaper pubishers and some others affected have expressed an intention to co-operate with the government in securing respect for these acts, and requests have been made to submit papers to the department for approval. For obvious reasons, the department cannot assume this responsibility.
"It is, however, undesirable that unnecessary information should be

laid and prosecution taken place against publishers who are observing the law. I desire, therefore, to impress upon you the necessity of your making a careful distinction between publications that are in conformity with the law and those that are not, and your going over the publications very carefully before advising that prosecution be launched.

"Crown attorneys throughout the province should consider each case on its merits, that the evil which the betting information act aims at may be eradicated without an undue number of prosecutions. It must be remembered that papers may in one issue conform to the law, and in another violate it, so that constant scrutiny will be necessary from time

to time with regard to various pub-lications offered for sale. Where either of these acts are being violated, particularly where there is a flagrant disregard for the provisions of the law, it is desired that not only the prosecution shall be actively pressed, but that the constant violator shall be rosecutor for each offense.

"Although I am not for any hard and fast ruling, I believe that Sunday should at least be just a little different from the week days," concluded Commissioner Pocock, who evidently feels that the mayors final warning to the people to deal with the utilities commissioners next election marks the termination of the fessionals from all over Canada, and some from the States.
