SUDDEN DEATH OF DR. F. L. PEDOLIN

Popular Newcastle Physician Passed Away Alone in His Office

Newcastle, June 7.—Dr. F. L. Pedolin, one of the best known medical men in northern New Brunswick, died suddenly early this morning. The doctor was called out professionally during the night. He evidently returned home exhausted and instead of retiring to sleep sat down in his office chair and passed peacefully away, presumably from a sudden heart attack. Members of his family found him sitting in his office early this morning. Dr. Pedolin was a native of Fredericton Junction and Doaktown, moving to Newcastle about twenty-eight years ago, and built up a large practice and was one of the most highly esteemed men on the Miramichi. Dr. Pedolin was a former Mayor of Newcastle. He was about 63 years of age, and is survived by one son, Percy, in Montreal, and three daughters, the Misses Ada, Lillie and Minnie, at home. His wife died some years ago. The news of Dr. Pedolin's death was heard all over the North Shore with regret, and will be a shock to friends throughout the province.
