IMPORTANT CHANGE IN FILM SERVICE

After This Week Imperial Serial Features Will Be Shown at the Opera House.

The statements appearing elsewhere in this issue relative to a change in direction of the Imperial Theatre will no doubt be of considerable interest to Campbellton theatre-goers.
Lack of time makes it impossible to definitely announce the new policy of the house in this issue but further details are promised for next week. However regarding the serial features which have been running at the Imperial Theatre—"The Iron Test" and "The Lightning Raider"—it is announced that the remaining episodes will be shown at the Opera House on the same days as formerly, excepting that in the event of road shows or other attractions at the Opera House, the picture program will be presented in the Imperial Theatre.

"The Crimson Gardenia" which has been advertised for the Imperial for next Monday and Tuesday will be shown in the Opera House instead. The Imperial Theatre will probably be closed on Monday and Tuesday next but open on the following Wednesday and Thursday when the Opera House bill will be a big Griffith production ("The Great Love") which commands advanced prices. The Imperial will be open with an attractive picture program at usual prices.

Further than this it is impossible to say at the moment but as mentioned above details will be forthcoming very shortly.

LEVIATHAN FOR AMERICAN LINE

Former German Steamer Will Run Between Southampton and New York.

LONDON, November 23.—The Government has directed the Pacific Steam Navigation Company to take charge of the German ships, both steam and sailing vessels, which were interned in Chile during the war. It is officially announced that the former German liner Vaterland, later the transport Leviathan, had been assigned to the American line and that it was proposed to put her in the Southampton-New York service.
It was announced in Washington on November 5 that the Leviathan would be operated by the American Line when placed in readiness for trans-Atlantic service probably next summer.

ROSEBERRY STREET SCHOOL GUTTED

Fire Does Heavy Damage at Fine School Building—The Insurance.

Last Thursday night at 10 o'clock an alarm was rung in from a fire in the Roseberry Street school. When discovered flames were bursting through the roof and the entire west end of the building was on fire. The firemen responded promptly but despite three heavy streams the fire gradually worked to the other departments and also to the new end in course of construction, and the entire building was completely gutted, only the walls left standing.
The Roseberry Street School which held four classrooms for the primary departments, was erected three years ago at a cost of about \$25,000. As it was not large enough to relieve the congestion at the Grammar school an ell, with six large classrooms, was planned and in course of construction when the fire gutted both buildings. The contract for the new ell was let to Messrs. J. & D. A. Harquail at \$32,650 and was well along towards completion. The both buildings were covered by \$50,000 insurance with \$3,000 on the furnishings. The loss is figured at about \$40,000 which is fully covered by the insurance.
The basement and walls are in good condition and the School Board has taken the matter in hand and are now at work cleaning up and salvaging any material. The insurance adjusters have been here and made a very satisfactory adjustment.
The School Board plans to roof the buildings and close them in. Some alterations will be made in the plans, and the whole interior of the building rebuilt this winter.
In the meantime the scholars are being accommodated at the Grammar school. Some departments, having session from 9 to 10:30 and from 1:30 to 2:30, while others begin at 10:30 and 2:30. The assembly hall is being again divided and more rooms provided there.

ONE ON THE JANITOR.
Friday morning early the janitor of the Roseberry Street School was on his job as usual. He came to the building and in the darkness saw signs of fire therein and promptly rang in an alarm from box 32, not knowing that the school had been gutted the previous evening. The firemen had a run for nothing just a short time after they had got home.

**PRINCE OF WALES
TO THE PILGRIMS**
Confidence and Good Will Felt By People in U. S. and Canada.
New York, Nov. 22.—The Prince of Wales attended the Pilgrims' dinner, on Friday night, wearing the uniform of captain in the navy. More than 1,000 guests were present. His appearance occasioned tumultuous applause. After the excitement was subsided, Right Rev. Charles Sumner Burch, Protestant Episcopal Bishop of New York, said, grace. Chancellor M. Depew, President of the Pilgrims' Society, was toastmaster.
Replying to the toast, the Prince referred to the part played by the Americans in the great war. "There is one other thing to which I should like to refer to-night," he continued, "and only because it has impressed me with new force during my travels on this continent, but also because it is an actual and visible example of the object and aims which the Pilgrims' Society was formed to promote. I do not think anywhere else in the world, two nations three thousand miles long except on the North American continent, will you find a frontier between with no extensive physical barriers, no military defenses, no other division lines than a boundary determined by mutual confidence and good will. As a Britisher and as a Canadian, I take a high pride in that boundary, the international frontier between Canada and the United States, for it seems to me to illustrate in a very striking and practical way the objects for what Americans and Britishers fought in the great war. Just think of it! The ideal which appears so difficult of attainment elsewhere has been an actual and positive reality in North America for over a hundred years."
"I have asked myself how that ideal has been attained here so much in advance of international conditions in other parts of the world, and I think the answer is quite clear. It has been attained because you, on your side of the international boundary, and we Britishers on our side, have under somewhat different forms, the same political faith, the same human aims, the same practical ideas."
"These two self-governing peoples, living side by side, each confident in the goodwill of the other, have given this splendid example to the world."
The Prince was presented with a silver loving cup containing a bouquet of roses. It bore a suitable inscription attesting to the fact that he had been elected an honorary member of the Pilgrims of the United States.
