FIGHT THE CORN BORER

Observations recently made in Elgin County, Ontario, particularly in the district of St. Thomas, by officers of the Entomological Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture and others, indicate that the European Corn Borer found in Canada for the first time in August, 1920, has come through the winter in a very healthy condition. The Department urges, therefore, the assistance in the efforts which are being made in controlling this dreaded pest and preventing its further spread.

The borer or caterpillar is the destructive stage in the life of the insect and it is in this stage at the present time within corn stubble, pieces of stalk, old ears, or other parts of the corn plant which were large enough to shelter it during the winter. Farmers, therefore, should realize the importance of destroying at once preferably by burning, all unused portions of corn stalks, cobs, waste, etc. Crop refuse around silos and also that left during the winter in infested corn fields should be carefully gathered up and destroyed by burning. Fields within the infested district should be kept free from weeds, as the borer has been found in thick stemmed grasses, ragweed, smartweed, lamb's quarters, etc.

THE LATE J. L. ENGLEHART

Mr. Englehart, who was a prominent resident of Lambton for many years, was born in Cleveland, Ohio, on November 2nd, 1847, the son of John Joel and Hannah Englehart, and was educated in the Cleveland schools. He was engaged in commercial life in the United States for some years, but attracted by the oil boom in Ontario then beginning, he came to this country in 1870. Launching into the producing, refining and exportation of Canadian petroleum and its products in 1871, he established his works at London, Ontario, with head offices in New York. Later he removed to Petrolia and in 1881 he became vice-president of the Imperial Oil Company, Limited.

He was married in 1891 to Miss Eleanor Thompson, daughter of the late Thomas Thompson, of Adelaide, Ontario. She predeceased him in 1908 and in honor of her memory he gave to the town of Petrolia his homestead consisting of the house and thirty-five acres of land for general hospital purposes, the Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital being established. In 1909 he presented an X-ray machine to St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto, and a chime of eleven bells to Christ Church, Petrolia, in 1910.

Besides his connection with the Imperial Oil Company, he was a director of the Bank of Toronto, and formerly president of the Crown Savings and Loan Association of Petrolia and vice-president of the London and Western Trust Company Limited.

He was a member of the Masonic Order and of the York and Hunt Clubs, Toronto, and the London Club of London. In politics he was a follower of the Conservative party and an Anglican in religion.

Petrolia, April 9.—Amidst every demonstration of public sorrow the body of Jacob Lewis Englehart was today laid to rest in the peaceful little cemetery on the outskirts of the town. The neighborhood was in mourning throughout the day. The business establishments in the town were closed during the afternoon, and a big crowd sought admission to the Anglican church, where the first part of the burial service was read.

The body arrived on a special train from Toronto about 1 o'clock. The service, which was conducted by the Bishop of Huron and the rector, Rev. Canon W. T. Hill, was a deeply impressive one. The hymns "Nearer My God to Thee" and "Lead, Kindly Light" were sung, and as the body was removed from the church the surplined choir sang the "Nunc Dimittis."

A brief but eloquent address was delivered by the Bishop of Huron.
