New Chimes at St. Peter

CHURCH CROWDED AT EVERY SERVICE.

CHURCH CROWDED AT EVERY SERVICE.

New Year's Day of 1902 marks an epoch in the history of St. Peter's Luth. Church, Berlin, as on that day the new chime of hells—said to be the finest and most complete in Canada—were dedicated to the worship of God. The day was set apart for special services of praise and thanksgiving, and they were most impressive and memorable.

A German service was held at 10.30 in the foresoon, at which, beside the pastor, Rev. R. von Pirch, there too hart Revs. Rembe, of Consutogo, and Brackebush, of Eganville. The congregation completely filled the edifice. The interior decorations were exceedingly tasty and reflect great credit on Mr. Schilling and his unsaturation of the complete service of the ceiling was suspended a large golden bell, from which were hung festoons to the walls.
