**Mr. J. M. Stabler's
Platform**
The Planks on Which He Stands

TO THE ELECTORS OF BERLIN:
Ladies and Gentlemen:—It is but
fair that in asking you for your sup-
port as Mayor, I should name the
chief planks of my platform. They
are:

- (1) I shall use my best endeavors
to keep the general rate of taxation
down as low as possible, consistent
with the necessities of the town.
- (2) It shall be my endeavor to have
the Ontario Legislature make the
Berlin sewer a Provincial et-
ernity farm, and to bear the
costs of conducting the experiments
for the solution of the sewage prob-
lem.
- (3) I favor placing the sewer
farm management in the hands of
a commission, similar to the Water
Works, but which members would
hold office for a period of from
three to five years, as I believe
the frequent changing of members
of the present Sewer Committee is
detrimental to the farm's interests.
- (4) I strongly favor municipal
ownership of public utilities and
franchises for the town, such as the
lighting system, the street railway,
gas, and other public franchises. I
believe that they can be made to
produce large revenues beyond their
maintenance; and that by owning
the public franchises Berlin will ex-
actly not require to levy any
direct taxation, but be tax free,
like Glasgow, Scotland.
- (5) I will pledge myself to aid in
securing as many new industries as
possible, so as to provide employment
for the workmen and keep Berlin
growing.
- (6) It shall be my endeavor to se-
cure additional railway connections
with the C.P.R. at Galt this year
and, if possible, without costing Ber-
lin a cent; and to have the line
extended to Wellesley and other
points nearby, as early as possible.
- (7) And finally to so conduct the
affairs of the town that citizens of
all classes may be happy, content
and progressive.

In conclusion I appeal to you as one
who has served you long and faithfully,
pledging myself if elected to serve you
to the best of my power.

**Mayorality Candidates
Air Their Views
And Platforms**

**RACE NOW BETWEEN
MESSRS STABLER AND EDEN**

MR. A. BRICKER RESIGNED TO-DAY.
The large attendance of ratepayers
at the public meeting at the Opera
House Wednesday evening, betokened a
keen interest in Municipal politics.
Addresses were delivered by the re-
tiring Chief Magistrate and by each of
the candidates for his chair. The
speakers waxed exceedingly warm and
undigned to a small extent in their
personalities. The Opera House
was as cold as a barn, and the
gentlemen had to keep their
throats warm by the two and a half
hours the meeting lasted.

Town Clerk Akler was appointed
Chairman and announced the object of
the meeting to be the discussion of
Municipal questions by the candi-
dates.

He first asked the outgoing Mayor,
Mr. G. F. Bowen, to address the
meeting, who pointed out that only five
of last year's aldermen were in for
re-election. He took up the Finance
Statement, pointing out that the dif-
ferent Committees had waxed close
to their estimates. The estimate on
poll tax is only \$7 out. The Board
of Works estimated expenditure was
\$2,000; it really was \$2,370, but a
credit of \$324 leaves only \$446 over-
draft. This is better than for some
years past.

The Board of Health had financed
very well. The estimated expenditure
was \$200 it was only \$119, and the
Board had receipts of \$93. The Char-
ity account showed only \$74 paid out.
This is better for some time, due
largely to there being more work and
at better wages than in previous
years. In dealing with the extror-
dinary expenditure for the water
grant to J. M. Stabler, which had been
money well spent, as it had been a
good aid for Berlin. An agreement had
been made with the Water Commis-
sioners whereby the hydrant rental had
been reduced \$5 on each hydrant. This
will save the town next year from
\$650 to \$700.

The local improvements made this
year total to about \$38,000, for which
debentures will have to be issued. This
is larger than for many years, the
existing macadam roadways over \$12-
000; sewers about \$3,000; cemeteries

**CHURCH CROWDED AT EVERY
SERVICE.**
New Year's Day, 1902 marks an
epoch in the history of St. Peter's
Luth. Church, Berlin, as on that day
the new chime of bells—said to be
the finest and most complete in Can-
ada—were dedicated to the worship
of God. The day was set apart
for special services of praise and
thanksgiving, and the services were
impressive and memorable.

A German service was held at 10:30
in the forenoon, at which, beside the
pastor, Rev. R. von Fitch, Miss West
—Mrs. A. H. Rembe, of Conestogo, and
Brackebush, of Egawville. The con-
gregation completely filled the edifice.
The German service was most
impressively and reflect great credit
on Mr. Schilling and his as-
sistants on the Decoration commit-
tee.

The formal dedication took place at
the forenoon service by the pastor,
who said:

"I now dedicate this chime for
the use of our church, the honor
of the Divine God, to edify the
faithful, to awaken the carnal
minded, to beautify our ser-
vices, to comfort the sorrowing,
to admonish the living, to remind
us of the departed—in the name of
"Father, Son and Holy Ghost."

The afternoon service was delivered
by Rev. Mr. Brackebush and in
addition to the church and boys choir
assisted in the service of song.

The Chimes.

There are twelve bells in all, tuned
in the key of D, concert pitch. The

New Chimes at St. Peter's

largest bells weighs 3,100 pounds,
the smallest 200 pounds, the
greatest weight being about 1,000
pounds. A feature of these
chimes is that they have the
diatonic scale of D, and in addition
they have the sharp fourth, the
flat fifth, which gives them the
key of the fourth, or G. Each bell
also have the flat seventh, or
F, which allows seven notes
key of the fourth, or G. Each bell
is attached specially within itself,
the most desired tone is
tonic, the principal, the minor
and sub-dominant, which are
set toned bells require—see discus-
sion in the chime of St. Peter's. The bells
have a peculiar beauty and richness
of tone, and each is tuned carefully
to ring out alone its tonic and prin-
cipal in perfect unison and with
these its sub-dominant and minor
third.

Names of the Bells.

Each bell has also an inscription
as follows:

First bell: "We thy servants are
twelve brethren.—Genesis XII, 13."
An called Simon, also Peter, origi-
nally cast 1858, foundered in
Second bell: "And I Amos, brother,
Donated by the Ladies Aid
Society, 1898, Recast 1902."
Third bell: "And I, James, a brother,
Zebedee's son, Donated
Young Peoples Association, 1896,
cast 1902."
Fourth bell: "I am called John,
Fifth bell: "And I Bartholomew,
Sixth bell: "And I Matthew,
Seventh bell: "And I Thomas,
Eighth bell: "And I James, son of
Alpheus."
Ninth bell: "And I Simon, brother
Tenth bell: "And I Judas, son of
Eleventh bell: "And I Paul, a
Twelfth bell: "And I Paul, a
son of Jonas Christ.—R. von Fitch
