A Mysterious Concern. THE PROPRIETOR SAYS HE OBTAINS MONEY FROM THE DEPT. 'A Boston despatch says: There is a man in Melrose who claims to have discovered the art of coining money out of dirt, and has been doing it some time. The business has been conducted in such a mysterious manner as to attract the attention of the secret service officials, but they let him retreat mystified, but satisfied that it is only one of the experiments of an extremely reckless man. The man's name is C. H. Washburn, and his invention has enabled him to make the most stupendous amount of money. He keeps the method a profound secret, yet the facts have leaked out. For two years this mysterious work has been conducted at 215 Mills, but none of the town's citizens have obtained the slightest hint of what is going on. These in return of the experiments are extremely curious. It can be spoken of however, as the 'atomic theory' or the disintegration of one substance and the formation of another by a new combination of atoms. OUTRAGE CRACKERS.—Mix three cups of the finest oatmeal, a tablespoonful of white sugar and a little salt with enough sweet cream to wet it. Put it in a cool place an hour or two, then stir in enough fine flour to make a dough that can be rolled out in a paste: roll thin, cut out and bake in a moderate oven about ten minutes.
