London, July 10.—The Canadian rifle team have been practising steadily at Staines for some time, and many good scores have been made. Yesterday a friendly match was shot by the full team, twenty, against a like number from the London Scottish volunteers, one of the best shooting battalions in the Kingdom. The weather was excellent and bull's eyes were put on at the various ranges, 200, 500 and 600 yards, with great regularity. At the conclusion of the match, when the scores were totalled up, it was found that the Canadians were on top, defeating the London Scottish team by thirty-two points. The totals were: Canada, 1,811; London Scottish, 1,779. In the individual scores Wilson, of the London Scottish, headed the forty with 97, follswed by 95 each by Captain Davidson, of the 8th Royals of Quebec, and Lieut.
