#### TELL YOUR NEIGHBOR

1903, for \$1.00 in advance. Last week concluded one of the most noted murder trials that has been written in the great record of the proceedcourt of justice in any country. Four years ago Roland B. Molineux, a New York man was arrested for sending through the mail a package of poison that caused the death of a woman. He was tried, convicted and sentenced to death. Last week he was released from prison and the jury were but twelve minute in finding a unanimous verdict of "not guilty." The result of that trial ought to discourage the infliction of mere circumstantial evidence has led to conviction. It is possible, it is even probable that many men equally as innocent as Molineaux, but with less influential friends, have paid the price for crimes they never committed. It took four years to secure a new trial for Molineaux, and only unlimited money and great influence could have stayed the execution of a death sentence for so long a time. The new trial saved him, and a review of the evidence offers but a flimsy fabric of motive,knowledge of poison and opportunity to place it within reach of the victim, for his conviction. Why was it that four years ago the same evidence proved so conclusive to the guilt of the suspected one? The judge and the jury then held it to be a clear case of guilt. Last week the judge held that the only evidence connecting Molineux with the commission of the crime was the handwriting of the address on the pcison, and the jury found the evidence valueless in the confusion and contradiction of expert testimony.


