After many narrow escapes of this nature, to my inexpressible relief, I came unexpectedly on a boreen or narrow horse road, leading, as it seemed downwards, into a gorge, between two rugged and elevated evening: hilltops; and I determined to follow it whereever it might lead, trusting that some sign of human habitation would eventually reward my perseverence.
