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ADEN

Text of Statement in Explanation of Vote on Question of Aden to be delivered in the Fourth Committee by the Canadian Representative, Mr. Gordon E. Cox, on Wednesday, November 3, 1965.

Mr. Chairman, I wish to explain the Canadian position on the resolution on which we are to vote.

Before commenting on particular paragraphs of the resolution, I should like to say that the Canadian Delegation has listened with great interest to the statements made by the petitioners and by the distinguished representatives on this Committee who have taken part in the general debate on the question of Aden. During this debate a variety of opinion was expressed and we had hoped that the fact that there was a genuine difference of opinion about the modalities of future constitutional development in Aden and about the actual situation prevailing in that territory would be reflected in any draft resolution placed before the Committee. We regret that the resolution in no way acknowledges difficulties faced by the British Government and the efforts expended in pursuit of its expressed aim of bringing South Arabia to independence not later than 1968. In general we consider that the resolution is not based on a balanced assessment of the situation in the area and accordingly proposals for United Nations acting deriving from that assessment are not likely to achieve a genuine step forward in the attainment of independence for the territory.

In addition, the Canadian Delegation believes that it must put on record its views on certain paragraphs. We do not consider that the General Assembly should make judgments in terms which infringe upon the responsibilities of the Security Council. Moreover, we consider that the judgment which is made overstates the case.
