areation in the minds of those who are going out to teach of the proper appreciation of the value of their work in the building up of a proper canadian citizenship.

Coming to the School for the Training of Teachers at Macdoneld College, Dr. Rexford claimed that the atmosphere there was not all that could be desired. He thought it was not satisfactory to have young women Who are being trained as school teachers brought up in such intimate relationship as existed at Macdonald with young women who are taking the Household Seience course, and with the students, principally male, who wiore attending the Agricultural College. Closer questioning brought to light that an impression prevailed that there was too much love-making going on between the struients at the College. To deal with this it was finally agreed that the Principal should create a new committee consisting of the heads of the three departments - Agriculture, Househola Science and School for Teachers - which committee would consider what additional regulations would be necessary.

Dr. Rexford and Dr. Permelee also pointed out that they considered that the Protestant Committee should have more direct control of the Hoad of the School for Teachers and should be consulted as to
