A few words on packing, or putting up the goods for transport may be of use to many. Flour should be put in a good cotton sack, 50 pounds in a sack; two of those are then put into a good strong gunny sack. For ordinary transport this is not more than enough, and for prospecting tours one of the 50 pound sacks inside the gunny sack will be found quite sufficient. Sugar, beans, rice, barley, meal and bacon may be packed in the same way, with advantage.

I would not recommend oiled cotton for covering, the oiling seems to rot the
