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*Majesty's Council*, and a number of *Gentlemen* of the  
*House of Representatives*; attended with a good  
*Guard*, and a fine train of *Young Gentlemen*; set  
out from *Boston* on *July 14*. and arrived at *Fal-*  
*mouth* the 16th.

On the 21<sup>st</sup>: His Honour received a Letter from  
*Wenemovet*, *Sagamore* and chief *Sachem* of the *Pe-*  
*nobscot Tribe*, dated at *St. Georges* *July 19*. Pray-  
ing him to meet the *Indians* at *Pennaquid*; which  
his Honour absolutely refused; requiring him to  
come to *Casco*, and promising him *safe conduct*.

On the 29th *Wenemovet* arrived, with a number  
of his *Principal Men* and others, about forty; and  
on the thirtieth the *Conference* for the *Ratification*  
of the late *Treaty* was enter'd on; and on the  
sixth of *August* it was concluded.

The *Penobscot Tribe* only appeared, but in be-  
half of all the other Tribes. The *Canada Tribes*  
had been sent to by them, and had sent a Letter  
(as they said) with two *Wampam Belts*; the one  
for their Brethren of *Penobscot*, in Token of sup-  
pose of their being concluded by them in the  
present *Treaty*; the other to be presented to our  
*Governour* upon the *Ratification* of the *Treaty*;  
which was accordingly presented.

The *Lieut. Governour* demanded of them, Why  
the *Narridgwalks* were not there? *Wenemovet* an-  
swered, that they had full power to act for them,  
and for the *Wowenocks* and the *Arreruguisenocks*,  
and the *St. Francis*.

The *Governments* had many and large *Conferen-*  
*ces* with the *Indians*; worthy to be communicated  
to the *Publick*, and which would be an *Enter-*  
*tainment* to the *Curious*. In these *Conferences* the
