TAUGHT PUPILS ART OF BURGLARY

Police and Detectives Liberally Bribed to Wink at Crimes.

NEW YORK, June 20.—(Can. Press.)—Jedro Rader, professor of burglary, made a confession this afternoon to Judge Swann. In the back of a room on the lower east side, Rader says for several years he has held daily classes in stealing. His pupils and pupils, of whom he mentions many by name, have stolen half a million dollars' worth of horses and merchandise, he estimates. Also, he says, they paid central office detectives, plainclothesmen and uniformed police thousands of dollars to avoid arrest.

A dozen or more burglars have told the police from time to time of Rader's school, but somehow he eluded arrest and kept on teaching his "trade." They got him when a favorite pupil "stealed" him.

This afternoon he sent word to Judge Swann that he wanted to confess. Seven closely written typewritten pages, locked in the judge's desk, contain what he said.
