

LABOUCHERE PASSES

Strongly Radical Views, Aired in Parliament and Truth, Gave Him World-wide Reputation.

FLORENCE, Italy, Jan. 16 .- Henry Labouchere, the editor and proprietor of The London Truth, died at his villa here this morning. Owing to failing health he had 're sided in Italy since 1906.

Henry Dupre Labouchere was during his long life one of the best-known of his long life one of the best-known of English journalists and members of parliament. Born in London in 1831 and the inheritor of estates which left him free to follow his own bent, his earlier life was full of incidents of a highly romantic character. Educated at Eton, he entered the diplomatic service in 1854 and for a part of his term was stationed at Washington. It is said of that period that on one occasion, when his chief had departed on a holiday, a Yankee entered the office and perempterily demanded to see the ambassador. Told he was not inside, the visitor sat down and waited till his patience was exhausted. To an ungent enquiry when the British min-ister would return, Labouchere calmly replied that he was expected in six weeks. There the story finis

in 1905.

Labouchere, altho a very wealthy man, was thruout his parliamentary career the exponent of advanced Radicalism and in 1889 placed himself at the head of its advocates. Refusing all offers of office, he was one of the most influential private members of the house of commons, and his carching of the Speaker's eve meant a full audience, delighted with his wit and humor, however obnoxious were the opinions he advocated.

Editor of Truth.

Perhaps, however, Labouchere was

Perhaps, however, Labouchere was most widely known thru his own journal, Truth. This was an offspring of The World, founded by Edmond Yates, with which Labouchere was at first associated as city editor. On their later separation not only London but the country waited every week for the lambasting the rival editors gave each other every issue while retaining their personal friendship.

As editor of Truth Labouchere was the determined foe of all social, financial and administrative takers. No man defended more libel actions, and in exceedingly few cases was he found in default. As a journalist he ranked

in default. As a journalist he ranked with the best and his letters to The Lordon Daily News during the investment of Paris by the German forces were and are of great historic interest. As member for Northampton he had Charles Bradlaugh as his colleague, from 1880 till Bradlaugh'z death in 1891.

NEW BRUNSWICK'S PLEAS

Ask Federal Government to Settle Fisheries and N.T.R. Claims.

MONTREAL, Jan. 16.—(Special.)—A. New Brunswick delegation composed of Premier Fleming, with Hon. Messrs. Grinmer and Maxwell, attorney-general and president of the council spectively, passed thru the city to-day en route for Ottawa. The attorney-scheral explained that they were going up to discuss certain fishery claims which the province has against the Dominion for some time past. There were also claims rising out of the pas-sage of the transcontinental thru the virgin forests of New Prunswick. Hon. Mr. Grimmer also announced that the prime minister of New Brunswick was endeavoring to secure meeting of the three maritime provinces executives for the purpose of taking joint and similar action touching the loss of federal representation following the next redistribution bill.


