London, Nov. 12-Germany has requested the president of the United States, according to a German wireless message from Berlin, to arrange immediately for the opening of peace negotiations, there being a pressing danger of famine.

The message was sent by Foreign Secretary Solf to Secretary of State "The armistice being concluded, the German Government requests the president of the United States to arrenge for the opening of peace ne-

"For the purpose of their acceleration the German Government proposes first of all to take in view the cona preliminary peace, and asks for a communication as to what place and at what time the negotiations might begin.

"As there is a pressing danger of famine the German Government is particularly anxious for the negotiations to begin immediately."

Ottawa, Nov. 12 .- The imperial funitions board desires it to be known that it is in communication with the British ministry of munitions with regard to the method to be adopted in ceasing munition production in Canada. The orders now running in Canada, which have been placed by the imperial munitions board on behalf of the minister of munitions and other British government departments may be divided into three classes: (a)—Articles which are no longer required at all, as a result of the cessation of hostilities, and of which nc use can be made, e.g., shells and explosives. The further production of these would be economically wasteful, and it is therefore expected that the British Government will give in-structions for their production to be

discontinued as soon as possible.
(b)—Articles which may no longer be actually required by the govern-ment, but of which use can be made. e.g., metals and raw materials of various descriptions. In this class it may be found possible to allow existing contracts to run out or to bring them to an end gradually, the British Government taking any loss on the materials as they are delivered. materials as they are delivered.

(c)—Articles which are still likely to be required, e.g., commercial lumber and ships. In this class it is not likely that any change will be made in existing contracts.
