

FORTUNES IN FEW MINUTES

Under the searching cross-examination of E. F. B. Johnson, E. C. Hargrave yesterday related stories of wealth in the Cobalt district, which enthused a majority of those present in the court.

United States, so long as we retained the power to prohibit exportation.

Mr. Hymen admitted this, but he explained that the treaty, if made, would be limited to a term of years.

Mr. Maclean (South York) replied that the present demand for electricity in Ontario was no criterion.

It was only a short time until all the great railways would be electrified. Already the New York Central had arranged to supplant steam with electric power between New York and Albany, and thence from Albany to Buffalo.

But the state should own and control this tremendous source of energy. The day might come when these falls would furnish light, heat and power to a large portion of Ontario.

If the municipal power commission was correct and electrical power could be generated at five dollars per horsepower or less to every household, every farmer could use the light, and, in time, the heat, while manufacturers, railways and other large consumers would be furnished with power.

The bill to license the export of Niagara Falls, as it is called, was correct, in principle, but the amendment was fatal. By the bill we claimed jurisdiction, and then by an amendment we gave it to the United States.

The thing to do now was for the Dominion and provincial governments to combine with the same good end in view and get rid of the outstanding franchises. We were to expropriate the three companies at Niagara Falls and generate and distribute the power at cost, no private company would attempt to compete.

In Defense of the Companies. Mr. German (Welland) said that seven years ago not a man nor a municipality could be induced to risk a dollar in developing energy at Niagara Falls. At that time the Canadian Niagara Company had a complete monopoly.

DETECTIVE BLACK PROMOTED TO OFFICE OF INSPECTOR

Resignation of Inspector Somerville Makes Vacancy—Other Appointments.

The announcement of the appointment of Detective William R. Black to succeed Inspector Somerville of No. 6 Station, was made by the police commission yesterday afternoon.

Inspector Somerville, who enters on his new duties on August 1, is one of the most popular and capable officers in the force.

GOOD MEN AND GOOD GIRLS TO BE BROUGHT TO CANADA

Capt. Harden of the Church Army Immigration Scheme Tells of His Program.

"Because there was no organization is the reason that Church Army immigrants have landed in Canada in such a destitute condition," is what Capt. Scout Harden of London, England, who has been sent out to Canada to report on the condition of affairs in this country, said last night to a World reporter.

"My purpose is to organize the movement," he said. "I have already Capt. Harden, who took passage on the Norseman, arrived in Toronto yesterday morning and spent most of the day at the immigration office, where he assisted the officials in disposing of 40 families, who had come across on the same boat. The officials gave the heads of the families work and Capt. Harden gave each man a poultice of money to start out with.

Indirectly the captain is representing the home government and reports to it as well as to the Church Army. He may stop in Canada for a month or more sizing up the situation and reporting home what policy should be adopted in handling immigrants. Already he has two plans, which will be submitted.

"I find," he said, "that servants are needed in this country more than any other class. I will advise the Church Army officials to send out as many young girls as they can find for positions of maids. The Church Army movement from now on should be a vicar named Carlisle, and when he asks for girls, good mothers will let their daughters come out, because they will trust him rather than any other agency, and those he sends out will be girls from the country, who are used to all kinds of house work."

"My other plan," said Capt. Harden, "is to have the government to purchase a tract of land in the Northwest and have young men sent out there to work on farms and let them experiment for themselves here." Before coming to Canada he toured with the Prince of Wales' party in India.

Between two and three hundred immigrants arrived at the immigration office last night from Montreal. They were off the steamer Pretoria, and were chiefly Scotch and North of England young men.
