Judging from the Sudbury surface specimens, he described the probable formation of the bed. The vein, he said, would, in all likelihood, descend with its present width for a few feet; widen out into a small pocket, then narrow again to the surface width, and finally broaden away out at a depth of 40 feet or so into a great chamber of rich coal.

A fourth mining expert, who wished his mane suppressed for the present, stated that the exhibit at Campbell, Curric & Co.'s is evidently taken from a cropping identical with what is found at the surface of the great English coal mines.

Mr. E. P. Rice, formerly superintendent of the Saskatchewan coal properties, observed that the display reminded him of samples of anthracite found in the Rocky Mountains. ANOTHER COAL DEALER'S VIEW.

Mr. Lamb. who opened the Canmore anthracite beds, stated that the success or failure of the Sudbury deposit all depended upon the quality that deeper investigations would bring to light.

DEATH SENTENCE PASSED.

The Prisoner Made a Speech Claiming Innocence of Murderous Intent.

Barrie, Oct. 30 .- (Special.)-"Guilty of murder, with a recommendation to mercy," were the words which the foreman of the jury in the Brennan trial uttered when he and his fellow-jurors appeared before His Lordship Chancellor Boyd at 9.30 this morning. In the early morning it had become noised abroad that the jury stood 11 to 1 at midnight in favor of a verdict of murder, and in consequence the court room was filled to hear the expected verdict and the sentence which nevitably follows. The suspense folinevitably follows. The suspense following the entrance of jury and prisoner, until the sentence had been pronounced, was awful, death-like stillness prevailing. The only ladies in court were the prisoner's daughters Agnes and May, who were accompanied by their uncle, J. J. Brennan, who has figured so prominently for the defence.
