Chicago Cattle.

Henry A. King & Co., 12 King-street east, received the following despatch to-day from New York:

The two important bull factors in wheat were the decrease of nearly 6,000,000 bushels in the world's supply, and the further reports that the French duty would certainly be reduced. Prior to receipt of these advices the market was rather weak although at about 92% offerings were readily absorbed. Letter being reported a good buyer around that figure. The local feeling, however, was bearish, and some were inclined to be aggressive until it was found their sales were being taken up by strong buyers. Liverpool showed a declining tendency, closing 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 lower than yesterday, while Paris and Antwerp were up 1/2 to 3/4. Primary market receipts were 1,000,000 bushels, against 2,000,000 bushels last week, and clearances were 750,000 bushels, as against 1,000,000 bushels, and covered freely on a late despatch that the French duty would be entirely removed during May and June and not reduced. July sold between 22 1/2 and 24, and the market was less erratic. The advance was higher than in the morning, and gave shorts a further scare to-day.

Large receipts and weak cables had a depressing effect on the corn market early in the morning, but prices rallied in sympathy with wheat. It is presumed that one or two large long lines were liquidated this morning, the decline was checked by Uplike and a few good traders, and the market was brought back to a level of about 34 1/2 to 35 1/2. Like grain suffered weakness in the fore part of the session, on the decline there was good buying, supposed to be for packers, which resulted in a recovery. The market later scored a good advance on the receipt of news from the European supply of land.

New York Cattle.

Henry A. King & Co., 12 King-street east, received the following despatch to-day from New York:

The stock market hesitated to-day under the influence of the report that the British houses followed up a lower range of values in London with large sales and that the market was generally weak. Considering the extent of realizing and the speculative buying, the market was a surprise. The maximum decline in sugar was 1 1/2 per cent, but nearly a manipulation in tobacco, the fluctuations covering a range of 3 1/2 per cent, and ending in a little above last night's quotations. WHEAT HIGHER AT CHICAGO

Though European Cables Showed Weakness.

The improvement on this side of the Water Due to the Big Decrease in the Visible and to the Removal of the French Import Duty.

Tuesday Evening, May 3.

On lower cables the Chicago wheat market opened up weak this morning, the bears being encouraged in their aggressive attitude by the large primary receipts, which were about three times as large as last week. July sold down to 62 1/2, but at this figure Letter and others were reported large buyers and the price quickly turned up. The recovery was sustained by a cablegram estimating that the total increase in the world's visible supply was about 6,000,000 bushels, and also by a cable to the effect that during May and June the import duty will be taken off all wheat entering France. Heretofore only reduction of the import had been counted on. The market closed firm, with May and July 3/4 above Monday's close. In Liverpool spot wheat closed unchanged with May and July 1/2 lower for the day. At Paris wheat closed 10 to 35 centimes lower, with flour 25c higher and 25c lower. At Antwerp wheat closed 25c lower.

On large receipts corn was weaker at Chicago and led to lower Liverpool. May oats declined 1/2 at Chicago.

Provisions closed strong at Chicago on reports that hogs, pork and lard were to be sold at 100c.
