THE BANQUE JACQUES CARTIER

Still Hopes to Resume Business, as It is Perfectly Solvent—Deponents Can Decide.

Montreal, Aug. 22.—(Special.)—The newly-appointed liquidators of the Banque Ville Marie have got to work. They say it is difficult to give an estimate of the length of time which the liquidation will occupy, but it is not likely to be completed before a year has elapsed.

THE DIRECTORS OF THE BANQUE JACQUES CARTIER are still working to secure the signatures of depositors who are willing to allow their deposits to remain in the bank for at least a year from the date on which the bank re-opens its doors.

FIRE DESTROYED 800 BUILDINGS

The Business Section of Victor, Colorado, in Ashes—Loss May Be Over Two Millions.

Victor, Colo., Aug. 22.—The total number of buildings destroyed by the fire which broke out here at 1:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon is estimated at 800. Nine-tenths of these were wooden and the fire spread with great rapidity, four hundred blocks, comprising almost the entire business of the city, are in ashes. The loss is estimated at \$2,000,000, and the insurance from \$600,000 to \$800,000. The most valuable buildings destroyed were the Gold Coin mine shaft houses, the loss of which is \$100,000. All the newspapers were burned out, but they have already arranged to continue publication. Victor has a population of 12,000 and will be quickly rebuilt to a more substantial manner than before.

Moncton, N.B., Aug. 22.—As a result of the Intercolonial Railway and a committee of the Order of Railway Telegraphers, a new schedule will go into effect immediately, by which the wages of telegraphers are increased, the increase to date from July 12. The new schedule is similar to that adopted recently by the Grand Trunk Railway, and will apply to the entire Intercolonial system, the Drummond County Railway and the Prince Edward Island Railway.

CRASHED BETWEEN TWO CARS

Thomas Kenny, a G. T. R. Wheel Tester, Met a Shocking Death Last Night.

MR. S. G. TREBLE DROPS DEAD.

One of Hamilton's Best Known Citizens Suddenly Succumbed to Heart Failure.

Hamilton, Aug. 22.—(Special.)—Thomas Kenny, Catharine-street, north, a Grand Trunk wheel-tester at the Stuart-street station, met his death at 7:30 this evening. He went between two cars to fix something and the cars came together, crushing the unfortunate man badly about the breast. He was removed as quickly as possible to St. Joseph's Hospital, where he died during the evening. Dr. Mackenzie attended the injured man. It had not been decided to-night whether or not to hold an inquest.

A Sudden Summons.
