CZAR LEARNS AND WEEPS ROJESTVEN

Official Announcement From Tokio of Result of the Big Battle-Two Transports and Two Torpedo Boat Destroyers Also Beneath the Sea.

Tokio, May 29 - (1.15 p.m.)-It is officially announced that Admiral Rojestvensky's fleet has been practically annihilated. Twelve warships have been sunk or captured and two transports and two torpedo boat destroyers have been sunk.

GREAT JAPANESE VICTORY, THO DETAILS ARE UNCERTAIN. Washington, May 29.-Official announcement of the result of the naval engagement between the Japanese and Russian fleets was received at the state department to-day in the following cablegram from

Minister Griscom, dated Tokio, May 29: "Admiral Togo has informed his government concerning the fight which took place on Saturday afternoon and Saturday evening. According to his eport the Japanese fleet under his command destroyed and sunk one battleship of the Borodino class and four other large Russian war vessels. Two or three more were captured. None of the

large Japanese men-of-war received serious injury.

"The battle was still in progress on Sunday. A great Japanese victory is announced here as the general result of the engagement, but few details have been received."

NEBOGATOFF A PRISONER AMONG 8000 OTHERS. Tokio, May 29.—Rear Admiral Nebogatoff, former commander of the fourth division of the Pacific fleet and recently commander of the information squadron, composed of scouts and merchantmen, with 8000 other Russians, is among the prisoners captured by the Japanese. Vice-Admiral Rojestvensky appears to have escaped.

The battle began Saturday morning and the Japanese are still in pursuit of the Russians.

NO NEWS AT ADMIRALTY REGARDING THEIR DEFEAT. Hence Togo's victory arouses far more intense interest here than any incident of the war, and is greeted by the newspapers and the people with great jubilation. Everywhere it is being compared with Trafalgar and Aboukir.

"Togo," says The Daily Telegraph editorially, "has won the Trafalgar of the far east, and won it, as his allies rejoice to note, in Nelson's year."

The same editorial recalls the fact that "Battles of Manila Bay and Santiago did not cost the Americans a single ship, and, indeed, hardly a single life, and it would therefore not be surprising to find that Togo had gained a relatively bloodless victory."

Russia's Glory Gone.

All the morning papers pay tribute to Admiral Togo's extraordinary success. They say that the sun has selon Russia's naval glory and comment on the possibilities of peace. Universal opinion is that it would be criminal for the Emperor of Russia to continue the war, but serious doubts are expressed as to whether even Satulday's disaster will convince the war party in St. Petersburg of the hopelessness of a further struggle. The version of Togo's report, published by the Japanese legation, says that the Vladimir Molomach foundered and was afterwards captured.

Torpedoes Did It.

Naval experts mostly agree that the greatest damage was done by the Japanese torpedo boat destroyers. It is said that Togo was prepared to sacrifice practically the whole of his mosquito fieet in order to destroy Rojestvensky's battleships and armored cruisers.

The surrender of several of the Russian vessels is regarded as proving the demoralization of Rojestvensky's men, and it is expected that further captures will be made before the remnant of his ships reaches Vladivostock.
