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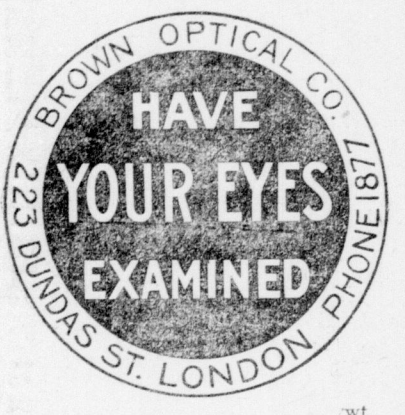

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"PAID IN FULL" AN EXCELLENT PICTURE, SHOWN AT MAJESTIC

Pauline Frederick Scores Success in Latest Film.

Seldom has a star a vehicle so admirably adapted to her own personality as "Paid in Full," the dramatic Paramount production, now playing at the Majestic. It is adapted to Pauline Frederick's special powers, and is a picture of her genius as an actress. Miss Frederick is a woman of beauty and magnetism. Her versatility is exceptional, and it enables her to portray heavy and light roles with equal effectiveness. In this, her latest production, she has a role of unusual dramatic power. It is sufficient to say that no other screen artist could play it to as good advantage as she does.

The story of the picture, which was adapted by Charles C. Whitaker, and directed by Emilie Chautard, is a powerful one and deals with the trials of a young woman who is the wife of a shiftless and improvident clerk. He steals a large sum of money from his employer, a Chandler known as Captain Williams, and to avoid prosecution he sends his wife to his employer as his intermediary.

The old captain seeks to ensnare the wife in his coils, when a brave westerner, who secretly loves the woman, threatens to kill him if he takes advantage of her. Helpless, he gives up the game and sends her away with a letter exonerating her husband. She then quits her husband who commits suicide in despair, leaving her free to wed the man who had befriended and loved her for years.

Some of the witty dialogues and sayings of the duet of vaudevillians, especially those of the male members, brought down the house. This clever pair are the official enemies of the blues, and in a waging war against them they certainly carry all their attacks to the limit.

James Montgomery Flagg never produced a more delightful comedy than "Impersonations," which is a feature of this bill. It is a humorous burlesque on Hun spy plays, stories and motion pictures and teaches the moral that even though defeated the Hun is constitutionally a menace to society. The situations are most laughable, while the line of the story is witty and amusing.

Pictures of travel amid the Pyramids and along the banks of the mystic Nile, and a British-Canadian Pathé News film of exceptional interest, and a high-class vaudeville act, featuring Frank and Mabel Brown, complete this bill, of which every part is a drawing card. BURNS FATAL TO AGED PATIENT IN LOCAL HOSPITAL

Bed Clothing Caught Fire and Thos. Logan Succumbed to Shock.

SIGHT HORRIFIED SISTER

As She Returned From Calling Physician She Found Sufferer in Flames.

Thomas G. Logan, aged 63 years, 119 Sydenham street, is dead as a result of severe burns sustained about the head and body yesterday morning. The deceased was a patient in St. Joseph's Hospital. He had been ill for some time from what was considered a fatal malady. Recently he was taken to the hospital, as his condition was serious and his family found difficulty in caring for him.

At the hospital he improved for a time, but of late his nights have been disturbed by sleeplessness. The attending physician noticed this and ordered that all matches, glasses, etc., be removed from his room. This was done on Tuesday night. However, he must have attempted to smoke and set the bed clothing afire.

Early on Wednesday morning one of the sisters entered his room. She found the patient disturbed and restless. She left for the office to phone for his doctor and immediately returned to his room. As she reached the hall near his room she was horrified to see the patient run into the hall with the bedclothes about him and in a mass of flames. He was rescued with difficulty. His physician was soon on the job and gave him every care, but the shock was too great. He succumbed some hours later.

No inquest has been ordered. The coroner was not notified, it not being considered necessary.

The late Mr. Logan was for a number of years an employee of the Carling Brewing Company. He had not been working for the past year, having been a sufferer from hardening of the arteries.

SOLDIER-PRISONER IS GETTING MUCH WORSE

Percy Johnson, the inviolable soldier who was sentenced to two years in penitentiary for stealing some small change from a fellow inmate at the Military Hospital, and who is suffering from an inflammation of the knee, has not been told from the jail, in spite of the recommendations of the grand jury. His condition is becoming worse each day.

He was brought from Carling Heights to the jail on the street car, as he was unable to walk such a long distance. From the car to the jail he was assisted by two escorts, at that time he could walk with difficulty.
