SURRENDER BY GOVT. FORCES

Italy Is Throwing a Naval and Military Cordon About City -Food Supplies Are Reported To Be Running Low and All Sources of Stocks Are Being Blocked.

Paris, Sept. 18.—Italy is throwing a naval and military cordon about the city of Fiume, which is still held by Capt. Gabriele d'Annunzio's forces. Food supplies are reported to be low, and an effort is being made to close all avenues by which stores can be rushed into the city, and thus to force the surrender of the troops holding the place. Advices received here indicate that Capt. d'Annunzio's men have entrenched themselves about the city and intend to defend it against any attack which may be made. In the event it is found impossible to hold Fiume, it is said, plans have been laid to destroy the city.

Gen. Badoglio, deputy chief of staff of the Italian army, is, in Fiume, and has issued a proclamation, calling upon the d'Annunzio troops to return to their units. Some are said to have left the city. Gen. Diaz, commander-in-chief of the Italian rmy, has been recalled from his vacation, and has been ir conference at Rome with King Victor Emmanuel and Premier Nittl.

All dispatches relating to the situation at Fiume are being subjected igorous censorship by the Italian Government, but it is reported that Rear-Admiral Casamova, who landed at Flume on Tuesday to restore order, is under virtual arrest there.

PRICES WILL BE CUT BY DRASTIC **ACTION OF BOARD**

Judge Robson Declares That Profits Will Be Regulated.

NO MORE FANCY BACONS

All Necessities Will Come Under Control of Board With Power to Prosecute.

Winnipeg, Sept. 17.—Judge H. A. Robson, chairman of the board of commerce, declared yesterday that drastic action cutting down the cost of necessaries will be taken by the board of commerce just as soon as the evidence at the different probes have been taken. No advances on necessaries will be tolerated, he said. The board aims to prohibit the sale of all fancy bacons. The retailer who makes a profit in excess of one cent per pound on any sale cess of one cent per pound on any sal-of sugar is liable to prosecution. This applies to Winnipeg dealers and is no limited to the east, Mr. Robson says.

Order To Be Definite.

Regulations covering all packing plants, and including such products as butter, eggs, cured meats and cold storage products in general will be drafted shortly. The order will be very definite, Mr. Robson declared. The board will deal with all the necessaries of life, including boots and clothing. Mr. Robson said. Prosecution will be made in every case where there is vlolation of the set profit by dealers. The board itself may impose the fine or institute criminal proceedings against the guilty parties.

Mr. Robson was not ready to give an outline of the provisions to be made for checking up of violations of the board's orders, but declared that every complaint brought to the board would be fully investigated and dealt with Immediately and to the full extent of the law.

Winnipeg. Sept. 17 .-- By an order-in-council passed yesterday, acting Premier Hon. Edward Brown and the provincial cabinet placed 6,000,000 acres of unimproved farming lands on the market for returned soldiers.
