HALF OF LOAN FOR
HOUSING ALLOCATED

Commission Wants Blanket
Bond For Returned Soldiers
From C. of C.

Loans made by the housing com-
mission to Londoners who wish to con-
struct homes for themselves and fam-
ilies, and who cannot do so on their
own finances, to date amount to
\$189,166. There remains \$190,834 under
the Ontario housing act of 1919 to be
allocated here, allowing a small bal-
ance to be utilized for loans to citi-
zens whose expenses in building have
exceeded the loan authorized. This
was announced at a meeting of the

local housing commission held last
night.

The commission will request the
Chamber of Commerce to turn over
the blank bond for \$20,000 which the
latter body authorized for surety on
housing loans to returned soldiers.

Applicants for loans certified by the
Chamber of Commerce will then re-
ceive same until the \$20,000 is ex-
hausted, thus eliminating the necessity
of issuing individual bonds to the com-
mission by the Chamber of Commerce
for each loan.

Mathew Lucas wrote to the commis-
sion stating that he could not build a
suitable house within the limits of the
\$4,000 loan granted him, and asked that

the property involved be conveyed back
to him on condition that he pay all
costs. The request was granted. Fur-
ther accounts and communications of
minor importance were passed, con-
cluding the business of the meeting.

HODCARRIERS WILL BE
IN LABOR DAY PARADE

Plans were made last night at the
meeting of the local hodcarriers for the
Labor Day parade and program. Be-
tween 125 and 150 of the men will turn
out and help make Labor Day this year
a much bigger success than in past

years. They will be distinguished by
the other laborers by a huge banner
bearing the number of their union as
the number of men who belong to it.
A mass meeting will be held on
market square on Saturday evening for
the purpose of reorganizing the local
union. Dr. H. A. Stevenson, H. B. Ash-
man and other men prominent in labor
circles will speak.
