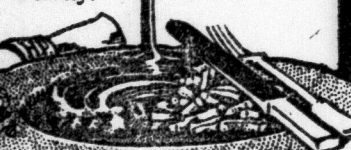

NO AMENDMENTS, NO DISARMAMENT LIKELY DECISION

League Will Probably Admit Austria and Bulgaria.

GENEVA, Nov. 24.—The committee of the assembly and steering committee of the League of Nations were all in session today. It is understood the committee on armaments, new members and amendments practically decided to report as follows:

No amendments this session and no general disarmament until conditions have become more settled in eastern Europe and execution of peace treaties is assured.

"TRUMPET ISLAND" IS FEATURE AT GRAND

Picture, Creation of Three Great Masters, Most Remarkable One.

"Life is queer," wrote George Randolph Chester, as he created the clever sub-titles of "Trumpet Island," a most remarkable picture, which is being offered as the feature of an excellent program at the Grand Theatre during the remaining part of this week. He did not say that at random, however, for he received his inspiration from a fascinating story of the twists and turns in the individual paths of human life as they cross and recross, become separated and interwoven. The result is just what one would expect from the combined efforts of three so celebrated authors. The wonderful story is cleverly unfolded amid scenes which were built up or chosen by the hand of a master. They are so gorgeous, so beautiful at times and at others so terribly wild and grotesque, that they make a fitting setting for the story and give the touch that makes the picture at all times well balanced and enormously interesting. The production has so much variety that it must appeal to all. There are scenes on rocky barren islands, sea beaten and torn, spectacular aerials, and a machine is destroyed in a furious storm, and the thrilling plunge of the broken plane as it falls with the heroine into a tree, thousands of feet below, where she is drunkenly rescued by a man and women indulge in sensuality, there are half-nude women, who perform classic dances before guests who drink and feast, and then immediately following a strange and grotesque scene of poverty. Spectacular scenes are followed rapidly by those filled with pathos and humor.

In keeping with the richness of the story and the settings in the excellent acting. Even to the minor ones the roles are well-handled, adding to the well-balanced and interesting production. The outstanding work is, of course, the acting of Marguerite De La Motte as Eve, and the play is so pretty and attractive and expresses the most difficult emotions in the most realistic manner. U. S. NAVAL FORCE STOPS CABLE LANDING

Reade, a member of the purchasing commission of Canada, speaking today for that body, denied emphatically the statements made at the convention of the Association of Managers of Homes for the Aged and Infirm at Hamilton yesterday that militia supplies had been sold as junk. Higher figures than those quoted had been obtained, he said, in nearly every case. Articles were sold to junk dealers by tender from military and charitable institutions had been notified and such material had previously been condemned as unserviceable.

CANADIAN PRESS, LTD., TO SECURE ACCESS TO REUTER SERVICE

Newspapers Will Have Direct Cable Service From England.

MONTREAL, Nov. 24.—(Canadian Press.) At a meeting of the shareholders of the Canadian Press, Ltd., held here today, it was decided to establish direct British cable service of news, supplementing the present services used by the Canadian Press, and the board of directors was authorized to enter into an arrangement for the British news service of Reuters News Agency, to be edited in London by Canadian Press editors, and carried to Canada by direct cable.

Under the new arrangement, the bulk of foreign news published in the Canadian papers has been received through the Associated Press of the United States, which, while being free from any color or distortion, has been open to the objection that it did not carry all news from Great Britain that the Canadian people were particularly interested in.

This development, which will greatly improve the service of all Canadian daily newspapers, is undertaken at considerable extra expense to the Canadian papers.

COMMITTEE NAMED TO GO TO IRELAND FOR INVESTIGATION

Washington Delegation Will Be Headed by Major Newman.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 24.—The "commission on conditions in Ireland" announced tonight that the subcommittee to go to Ireland to conduct an investigation would be headed by Major Oliver Newman, former military commissioner of Washington, D.C., the other members being Rev. Dr. Norman Thomas, New York; James H. Maurer, president Pennsylvania State Federation of Labor, and Arthur Gleason, New York.

The delegation will sail as soon as passports have been obtained, the statement said, and will pay particular attention to hearing the British point of view in the present critical situation, both from official government sources and from all shades of public opinion.

ASKS HAMILTON TO RAISE NURSES' PAY

HAMILTON, Nov. 24.—Nurses in training in the General Hospital receive the following remuneration: First year, \$7.00 per month; second year, \$7.50; third year, \$8.00. Chairman H. T. Pratt of the hospital board of governors asked the board today to increase the nurses' pay, which he said is totally inadequate, he said. Decision in the matter was postponed.

ALMOST \$8,000,000 WAGERED IN THREE ONTARIO RACE MEETS

TORONTO, Nov. 24.—Almost \$8,000,000 was wagered in three Ontario race meets during the last racing season, according to statistics issued today from the provincial treasurer's department. At the Hamilton Jockey Club fall meeting the total was \$2,000,000 and at the September Windsor meet the total was \$3,607,770.

Of the \$2,000,000 total, the Hamilton Jockey Club retained \$208,050, plus a surplus of \$15,171. The net profit was \$78,888 at the Windsor meet of the Western Racing Association, held July 3 to 10, the amount wagered being \$1,999,367. The amount wagered at this meeting was \$3,607,770.
