Abolition of Bonuses.

Mr. Downey's bill to abolish bonuses aroused some debate. He defended it on the ground that the cry from the municipalities which had suffered from unfair competition justified it. He argued that big corporations held up the municipalities by their willingness to go where they could get most money.




