FRENCH DRIVES CAPTURE WOOD

Strongly Organized German Position Falls to Attack on Somme.

LOSE WAR MATERIAL

Germans Also Suffer Severe Repulse at Fleury Village.

(Continued From Page One).

large quantity of war material remains in our hands. Our batteries showed great activity on the whole Somme front.

"Everywhere else there were gusts of artillery fire except in the Fleury sector, where the enemy violently bombarded the village."

The night was calm along the Somme front. On the right bank of the Meuse (Verdun front) the enemy displayed great activity during the night. After an intense bombardment lasting for several hours the Germans made various attempts to capture the village of Fleury. Chilled by a cold rain, they were repelled by our fire. The enemy suffered severe losses and left some prisoners in our hands.

Fox Suffers Check. "At about the same time the Germans attacked our trenches northwest of Thiaumont. All their attacks were repelled upon them a sanguinary check."

"In Lorraine a surprise attack by the enemy against one of our small posts near Vevo was repulsed easily."

"North of the Somme, apart from an operation of detail which permitted us to eject the enemy from the portion of the trench he penetrated last night north of Maurepas, the day has been quiet. Our troops actively pressed forward the work of consolidation on the conquered front. The artillery actions were of small importance in consequence of the bad weather."

"In the Argonne we exploded a mine which wrecked the enemy's advanced works at Vanuosa."

"On the right bank of the Meuse artillery fighting continues actively in the Fleury - Vnuux - Chaprais sector. There has been no infantry action, the remainder of the front there was no action of importance."

ADMITTED SENDING MONEY TO AUSTRIA

Wife of Tony Kampoka Made Trips to Buffalo to Forward Amounts.

BOTH ARE ARRESTED

Large Sums Were Collected From Aliens Thruout the City.

Charged with assisting alien enemies Tony Kampoka, aged 32, and his wife Helen, aged 30, were arrested at their home at 540 Perth avenue Saturday night by Detective Maurer. Both the accused are Austrians and have been in Canada for 13 years. For many months Mrs. Kampoka has been collecting money from aliens in the different parts of the city and making trips to Buffalo, from which place she forwarded it to Austria for patriotic work.

When arrested she said that the money was sent to her mother in Austria, but later confessed to the police that money ranging from \$50 to \$75 was given her, as well as her railway fare and expenses every trip that she made across the border. The husband also admitted that he knew his wife was sending the money to Austria, and that he had received a letter from her. The Kampokas own the property on Perth avenue and have four small children. One part of the house is rented to people who look after the children.

The husband was employed as a munition worker in a Toronto factory, and will vacate his office as the wife and she will appear along with her husband in the police court this morning.

SIR FREDERICK BENSON IS DEAD AT MONTREAL

He Headed British Commission for Purchase of Horses and Mules.

General Duff Recalled to Testify Before Mesopotamia Commission.

Official Statement Gen. Monro Succeeded Gen. Hamilton at Dardanelles Last Year.

LONDON, Aug. 20.—The war office tonight announced a change in the chief command in India. Gen. Sir Beauchamp Duff has been summoned home to give evidence before the Mesopotamia Commission, and will vacate his office as commander-in-chief, being succeeded by Lieut.-Gen. Sir Charles Carmichael Monro.

Gen. Duff has been commander-in-chief in India since 1913. He is 61 years of age. Lieut.-Gen. Monro has been commander of the first army, succeeding Gen. Sir Douglas Haig, who the latter was commander-in-chief of the British forces in France and Belgium. Gen. Monro was commander of the British expedition to the Dardanelles in 1915, succeeding Gen. Sir Ian Hamilton.

RUSSIANS MAKE GAINS IN DIARBEK ADVANCE

Capture Pass in Almost Inaccessible Range of Mountains.

Special Cable to the Toronto World. DIARBEK, Aug. 20.—Important gains have been made by the Russians in their advance on Diarbek, in the Caucasus. It is announced by the war office. The Russians have captured the pass in the high and almost inaccessible range west of the Bingedjan Mountains and they are successfully surmounting the difficulties in connection with the transit of this inhospitable chain.

The following official communication on the Caucasus operations was issued here today: "In the Diarbek fighting continues, our gallant troops overcoming difficulties presented by the high and almost inaccessible ridge west of the Bingedjan Mountains. West of Lake Nozkyget our detachments drove the enemy out of the mountain pass near the village of Kadych, taking prisoners during the pursuit. Southwest of Urm Lake fighting continues in the region of Uchun."

WILL BE IMPORTANT MEETING.

The meeting of the Scarborough people to be held at Scarborough Junction shortly to endorse the action of the council and the Hydro Commission in respect to the active prosecution of a power and light line to the "Sunshine" and Agincourt, will be one of the most important held in the township in a long time, and will be largely attended. The long delay in starting the work has aroused the people, and nothing will be allowed now to stand in the way of getting down to active construction this fall.
