## Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The sole head of a family, or any male over 16 years old, may homestead a quarter-section on available land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or at the Survey for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 40 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$10.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as a homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$100.

## SUSPECTED OF PLOT TO CRIPPLE CABLE

## Three Men Arrested on Board Mysterious Yacht in Boston Harbor

Boston, April 8.—Three men, one of them an alleged German naval reservist, were arrested last night charged with conspiracy to commit acts of sabotage against the United States and a foreign nation by interfering with telegraphic communication. Department of justice officials are investigating a report that the three—Ernest Bethge, formerly of the crew of the Hamburg-American liner Cincinnati, which was seized here Friday morning, and Erik T. Bloomquist and Ellis Homberg, Swedes who came here from Buffalo, N.Y., were going to try to cripple some of the transatlantic cable lines off the Massachusetts coast.

The arrests were made aboard the 33-foot yacht Sparrowhawk as she was going down Boston harbor. Bloomquist and Homberg, who are members of the seamen's union at Buffalo, said they had been hired by Bethge to go to fishing off Provincetown.

Excuse Too Filmy. It was pointed out by the authorities, however, that the yacht, which was a private property, was not well adapted for trawling, and that little or no trawling is done off Provincetown. On board the Sparrowhawk were a net, 1500 feet of wire cable, a big winch and a few other tools. The boat itself was not seaworthy, according to the naval reservist, and was making heavy weather in the inner harbor when the patrol boat came up to her. The yacht had been purchased recently by Bethge from a tank dealer and had been taken out of the hands of refitters before the work had been finished.

Bethge secured his first naturalization papers several months ago, and had recently been employed on lake steamers out of Buffalo, N.Y.

FOE WIRELESS PLANT ON ROOF OF MANSION

Sensational Discovery at Home of Daughter of Late Millionaire Brewer.

New York, April 8.—United States secret service agents have discovered, it was learned tonight, that until a few weeks ago a wireless receiving plant of the most expensive type was operated on the roof of the Fifth Avenue home of Mrs. Hugo Reisinger, daughter of the late Adolphus Busch, millionaire brewer of St. Louis.

While the secret service agents maintained strict silence, it was understood they had information that a German who had been employed as a butler in the Reisinger home constructed and operated the wireless plant. He recently resigned his position, it was said, and disappeared.

Mrs. Reisinger had often entertained at her home Count von Bernstorff, Dr. Heinrich Albert, Germany's commercial attaché, and Caystian Kay-Boy-Ed and Franz von Papen, naval and military attaches, respectively.

U. S. HAS SUSPENDED ALL MAIL TO GERMANY

Has Also Instructed All Post-offices to Refuse Mail to Other German Allies.

Washington, April 7.—Postmaster-General Burleson today suspended mail service to Germany during the war, and also instructed all post-offices to refuse as well any mail destined for Austria-Hungary, Luxembourg, Bulgaria and Turkey, as it cannot be despatched at present without passing through Germany.

Mail from the countries last mentioned which may be received in the United States will be sent forward to destination.

## Anti-German Sentiment Running High in Brazil

Rio Janeiro, April 8.—A large number of students carrying the flags of Brazil and the allies took part in a demonstration today against Germany. They waved the newspapers, where patriotic speeches were delivered. A demonstration was also carried out against the German consulate, the students singing the Marseillaise.

## Torpedoed, Reaches Port

London, March 8.—How the British armed merchantman Queen Louise, from Philadelphia for Dunkirk, with railway supplies, was torpedoed without warning March 31 off the French coast and managed to put into the port at Havre without casualties was described in a message received at the state department today from Consul Osborne at Havre. There were several Americans in the crew.
