St. John Exhibition, September 12th to September 19th.

S. S. Mount Royal docked at Quebec at 8.40 p.m. Tuesday. She lands passengers this morning.

The West India steamship Sobu, Captain Bridges, will sail tomorrow for Halifax and the South.

Policeman Hamm shot a dog owned by Thomas Martin today. The canine had bitten Willie Flynn, a nine-year-old boy, on Rockland street.

A number of entries have been received from Moncton for the Every Day Club sports on the forenoon of Labor Day. There will be keen contests in all events.

The funeral of William Ashton took place at 2.30 p.m. from his late residence, 238 City Road, to the Cathedral. Interment was made in the Old Catholic cemetery.

The members of the Every Day Club life and drum band have decided to have their uniforms decorated with a fine gold braid. The band meets every Tuesday and Friday evening.

A leading Conservative stated this morning that the party would either purchase or establish a newspaper in the Conservative interest in St. John, and that a strong company had been organized. He said further that if they started a new paper the first issue would appear within a few weeks.

A tea will be held on the grounds of the St. John Tennis Club this afternoon. Arrangements are being made for playing the annual mixed doubles handicap for the club cups now held by Miss J. Trueman and L. W. Barker. Those intending to compete are required to send their names in this week.

The City Cornet Band will give another of their enjoyable concerts on the King Square band stand to-night if they return from the political picnic at Rothsey in a reasonable hour. In their initial appearance on the stand tomorrow evening the Carleton Cornet band will dispense an especially preparatory programme. The cost of constructing the stand amounted to \$2,000. \$1,000 has been subscribed and of that sum half has been paid in.

There has been considerable complaints from owners of pool and billiard rooms of the recent by-law passed by the common council imposing a license on all pool and billiard rooms. Those in the business claim that as they pay taxes they should not be called upon to take out a license also. Many are threatening to go out of business, and as the mayor insists on the law being enforced it is possible that a number of pool and billiard tables will be for sale very soon.

What was probably an attempt to burglarize the People's Dairy on Union street early this morning was frustrated by the timely appearance of the police. In the vicinity of 3 o'clock two men were seen acting suspiciously in the alley adjoining the dairy. When Policemen Belyea and McCollum were seen approaching the individuals decamped. Both officers decided to ascertain if a break had been made and on investigation it was found that a rear window had been opened. The window was secured properly by the patrolmen with a lock and staple.

The death occurred about 1.30 o'clock this morning at the residence of his mother, 42 St. James street, of Walter Coady, of Dorchester, Mass.

Mr. Coady had been ill about nine months and came to St. John about four weeks ago. He was about 38 years of age and is survived by his wife, and two children, mother, two brothers and two sisters.

MONTREAL STOCKS

Montreal, Que., Sept. 2 (Special)—Montreal Power was dealt in heavily at the opening of the stock market today. The rise of the price to 95 1/2 yesterday led to the prediction that heavy selling would come when the price touched par. This prediction was justified, but nevertheless all offerings were absorbed and bull operators forced the price to 100 1/2, the highest point reached in several years. Of the other stocks, Lake of the Woods sold up to 95, Havana to 35 and Rio to 80; So. 124 1/2, Pacific, 173 1/2; Richelle to 74 1/2, Mexican to 78, Illinois pfd. to 88 1/2, Shawinigan to 73 1/2, Dom. Steel pfd. to 65 1/2 and Montreal St. to 18 1/2.

HUSBAND AND WIFE IN POLICE COURT

Domestic Differences Revealed in the Case of Mr. and Mrs. James McRae.

James McRae was arrested this morning by Policeman Sleeves on a warrant issued by his wife, Ida McRae, for assaulting her in their home on Clarence street yesterday.

Mrs. McRae alleges that she was grossly ill-treated.

The prisoner was taken into custody at Law's wood factory on Clarence street where he is employed.

In the subsequent hearing before the magistrate much friction was disclosed between husband and wife.

Primarily the wife's grievances originated in McRae's alleged neglect of her and his affection for several affinites.

The magistrate rebuked McRae strongly and at one stage was interrupted by Mrs. McRae exclaiming, "Now, Judge, he doesn't listen to you any more than that."

She dramatically indicated the boards underneath with her finger.

"When he goes home he'll order me out of the house," she continued.

"Do your children know of your husband's actions?" inquired His Honor.

The respondent, after a moment's addressing the prisoner His Honor admonished him, saying he would have only five minutes should pry the boards under his feet when he reached his home.

McRae attributes the accusation to jealousy on the part of his wife. He said he had a horse and carriage last summer but as his wife continually declared she would not ride and would not drive other women about, he eventually disposed of the horse of contention.

The magistrate advised both parties to affect a reconciliation and bury the past. There was no difference in religion in this case and therefore one objection was eliminated.

It is probable that no further action will be taken in this matter.
