A family, or any male over 18 years may homestead a quarter-section of valuable Dominion land, if the homesteader is a Canadian born or naturalized citizen. The applicant must be a person on the Dominion Lands Act Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by him may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter or brother or sister, or by an intending homesteader. — Six months' residence on cultivation of the land in each of years. A homesteader may live within 30 miles of his homestead on a farm of 30 acres solely owned and occupied by himself, or by his wife, or by his son, daughter or brother. —
