### MANY NOVELTIES SHOWN IN WHOLESALE MILLINERY

The small shapes are the general favorites for present wear, but some very beautiful large picture hats are shown for future use.

One particularly striking model is from the showrooms of Madame Barroco, Place de l'Opera, Paris. It is a large brooch, rosylin flap, trimmed with wreath of foliage and tiny goldfinches with a large falling bow of royal velvet ribbon at the back.

Another model that is attracting a great deal of attention is from the showrooms of Madame Poyane, Rue de la Paix, Paris. This is of dull helio-togal braid, with the crown completely covered with grass and wild flowers, underneath the brim being banked with quantities of brown maline and cup roses.

Another hat from the Maison Lewis is a handsome empire shape made entirely of black spotted net over gold cloth, the crown being pulled on, similar to the 1899 model, and in the time of Marie Antoinette. It is trimmed with three handsome black plumes falling from the left side.

"In fact it might be said," continued Mr. Branscomb, "that the general effect of the hats shown at the opening of the season is to look back to the days of our grandmothers and if we were to turn back to some of the old portraits of the time of 1899 we would get a good idea of the styles of today. The milliners of Paris have evidently copied their ideas from some of the old paintings in the art museums of the time of Marie Antoinette, Madame Pompadour and other celebrities."

At Brock & Paterson's

The showrooms of Brock & Paterson were invaded by a large crowd of eager buyers, and the tastefully arranged tables and shelves with their wealth of hats, both made up and in plain shapes, trimmings of varied hues and ornaments of all kinds attracted a lot of attention. The "mushrooms" were very much in evidence, as were also crinoline plaques, made up in different shapes, and the new creation, the "airship" hats.

Miss Margaret Smith, the head milliner for Brock & Paterson was ill today but Miss Green, the assistant, gave the Times man a description of some of the creations shown. One of these was a large leg-plaque, trimmed with shaded roses and shaded wheat in green and brown tones, and green ribbon with a fancy pin. Another was composed of crinoline braid in pale blue and bronzy green, trimmed with Dresden ribbon in blue and rose shades, shaded roses and green maline. Several flower turbans trimmed with rose, malines and aspreys were also on exhibition. The leghorns were very much in evidence, both in plaques and chip hats. Grasses and wheats of all descriptions, roses, violets, poppies and forget-me-nots are being used in almost all the new hats. Mr. Roach, of Brock & Paterson said that the attendance at the opening this season was larger than for some years past, and any doubt there may have been that St. John is the centre of the maritime provinces for the millinery trade has been removed. This firm will hold their opening at the Halifax branch next week.

At The London House

A particularly good display, most artistically arranged, is that shown at the London House, Limited. The large, well-lighted millinery showrooms were judiciously adorned to set off to full advantage the decorative scheme was a large sign "The London House Wholesale" worked in artificial flowers. Buyers and copyists thronged the showrooms early this morning and expressed much delight at the showing made. The pattern hats were especially pretty and modish and among them were noticed many novelties.

One very pretty one was a sailor shape of crinoline or pyroxylin braid in old rose, trimmed with ribbons and pastel blues.

Another gem was a crinoline flap hat in reseda green, trimmed with the poplar helio and maize roses. A dashing sweet asprey gave to this creation a particularly chic and modish effect.

A sky-blue crinoline sailor shape fashioned high at the side and trimmed with ribbons, tulle and forget-me-nots.

A reseda green crinoline, which showed the mushroom effect to advantage, pastel roses, ribbons and chiffon making a surpassingly beautiful hat.

Another delightfully pretty one showed the mushroom shape in a chip hat in pale blue trimmed with pale blue ribbons and white and helio lilacs.

But these are only a very few of the exceptionally large number shown all of which compare very favorably with any previous display. The London House makes a first-class showing of flowers, braids and other millinery accessories.

Mr. Frank Skinner of the firm, who has recently returned from the London and Paris centres, said that flowers would be used in great abundance on this year's hats, roses predominating, with lilacs also in high favor.

Altogether the London House makes an excellent display.

### FORESTALLING IN THE MARKET

Another Case Reported To the Police Court.
