MY NATIVE PLACE.  
By EDWARD ROWLEY.

O what a joy it was to me  
To go unto my native place;  
Where many were most dear to me,  
To see and to embrace;

The kind old mother, she who long  
Widely anxiously my coming wait,  
With patience and affection ever true,  
Beside the garden gate;

My father with that sweet old maid,  
Where less appeared of loving zeal,  
Yet in whose cordial grasp of hand  
I felt how he could feel;

And brothers, sisters, not a few,  
Who lallied me, when I was ushered in,  
The youngsters with a merry din,  
And then through those old fields to pass,  
Where in our childhood we had played;  
Flowers sporting in the sunny grass,  
Or gathering in the shade.

O, then it was a joy to me  
To go unto my native place,  
Where many were most dear to me,  
To see and to embrace.

Now, after many years, I go,  
A grave and thoughtful man,  
Many to meet, and few to know,  
Slow pacing where we ran.

Little I find of love or praise  
In hearts that were my own of late,  
But wander, in a thoughtful maze,  
And nothing see nor hear.

The present is not—in the past,  
The future's in the mind, as in a dream,  
And dimness from the heart is cast  
Of fond and cold, and dream.

My native home, when it is found,  
The stranger in it dwells;  
And there is sorrow in the sound  
Of those old village bells.

**HIGHLANDER.**  
A HIGHLAND SETTLER.—The best method of attracting the prosperity of settlers (says M'Gregor, his excellent work on British America), is by giving instances of individual success. Among the settlers in New Brunswick, I had some conversation with an old Highlander, from Sutherlandshire, one of the soldiers of the 42d regiment, who were disbanded in America after the revolution war. This man had settled on the banks of the Nashwaq, and scarcely ever since been absent from his farm, and he had become a rich man. He had never received from the sale in which he was born, by which he immediately discovered where he came from; one of the sons of the Gaelic varying as much in one place, or in one of the isles of Scotland, from the other, as the pronunciation of the inhabitants of the several counties in England does. When I addressed this good man in his native language, he very soon seemed to feel all theapture of early enthusiasm, and I never can forget the bright warmth of countenance, and the ardour of his language, when describing the state of the Highlands, and the situation of his countrymen. He said he used for the first few years to receive now and then letters from his friends, but that his relatives gradually drop-

ped off, some by death, others by removal to distant countries; and that for the last twenty years he had no direct intelligence from Sutherland. Never could his country, however, cease to be dear to him.

"Never," said he, "will I forget the tales, the songs and the music we heard in the Highlands; we recite or sing them during the winter evenings, and our children will ever remember them, and I hope, transmit them to their offspring." He said, that although government did much for them (his neighbors and himself), they nevertheless suffered very great hardships for the first few years after settling where they now live.

"There were some idlers and faint-hearted people," he said, "among us, who left the settlement, but those who have remained here prospered. I am myself as comfortable as I can be. All my family are married; some of them live with me; others have farms of their own. I have very little to do but enjoy myself among my children and my grandchildren; and although the best years of my manhood were spent fighting for my king, and the greatest part of my life since that period has been spent toiling for the support of my family, and for the education of my children, yet I have great reason to be contented, and I am thankful and grateful to God, in whom I trust, for a peaceful and calm retreat, through my declining years, to another world." This is nearly a translation of what he said, but I have endeavored to give the force of expression to the language in which he spoke—that of nature.

**CHARACTERISTICS OF CURR, IRELAND.**—Every thing about Curr bears an appearance of wealth. The gentlemen, the ladies, and the tradespeople dress much the same as in London; but among the common people the eternal great coat hangs down to the heels and the women's great with the hood over the head, are worn even in the hottest weather; under the cloak is generally a brown gown, a green petticoat, and blue stockings, if any of the latter be worn, which is not often the case; under the hood they wear a white muslin cap. The most common vehicle is the jingle, they are very numerous in the streets. The charge is sixpence from any part of the town to the other. Besides these, there are plenty of Travellers, as they are termed, which carry in the same manner for one shilling; they very much resemble "Brighton flies." From the moment the slightest intimation is made, or a supposed intention of engaging a vehicle, one is immediately beset on all sides with open mouths, proclaiming the superiority of their respective jingles, and pointing to the miserable horses, so much on a par, that it would puzzle the most learned in horse-flesh to come to a decision. To do so, however, is a matter of necessity, for so soon as you have made your choice, you are almost torn to pieces; but the moment you have fixed upon your jingle, the squabbling is immediately at an end.

**DOMESTIC FELICITY.**—Mr. H.— took great delight in tormenting others, and pointing to the miserable lot of his wife, who he had married at a very early age, his wife being absent at a neighbor's. "Some time afterwards," he returned, and finding the door closed, demanded admittance. "Who are you?" cried the husband; "Let me in I am very cold." "Begone, begone, woman!" said the spouse; "I don't know you." "But I must come in," "What's your business?" "You know very well," it Mrs. H.— "The husband burst into a horse laugh. "Mrs. H.—" he exclaimed, "She is a very likely woman, she never keeps such late hours as this!" The lady instantly replied, "if you don't let me in, I will draw my knife, and cut your throat." "She immediately took up a log of wood, and plunged it into the well, and retired to the side of the house. Mr. H.—, hearing the noise, rushed from the house to see as he supposed, by drawing water. She at the same time stepped in, and closed the door after her. Mr. H.—, almost naked now demanded admittance. "Who are you, exclaimed the wife. "You are the same," replied the husband, "let me in, I am almost frozen to death." "Begone, you knave!" "I am no knave," sighed the husband, "I am Mr. H.—" "Mr. H.—, indeed!" exclaimed the wife; "that's a likely thing I my husband never keeps such late hours as this!" After keeping the poor wretch shivering in the cold till she thought that she had cured her husband, she reopened the door and let him in. He never repeated such a cold trick.

The improvement consists in eating the bread and butter bottom upwards, which by bringing the butter into immediate contact with the tongue, instead of wasting its effluvia in the roof of the mouth, enables one half of the quantity to do the same service. **CHURCH SOCIETY**  
OF THE  
Archdeaconry of New-Brunswick.

The first meeting of the "Church Society of the Archdeaconry of New-Brunswick" took place, pursuant to notice, on Thursday last the 9th inst. the Clergy and Lay Deputies from several Parishes having assembled in General Committee the day before.

The business occupied the whole of Thursday and the day following. A full report of the proceedings will be presented to the Public as soon as it can be prepared. For the present it will suffice to publish a brief abstract, containing a list of the officers elected, and the Constitution of the Society as finally agreed upon at the meeting, and then solemnly and unanimously ratified and confirmed.
