HOW THOS. HAMILTON MET HIS DEATH IN MILL AT OLDTOWN

An Old Town despatch to the Bangor Commercial reporting the death of Thomas Hamilton, says:—

"Thomas Hamilton of this city, foreman for the Jordan Lumber Co. at one of its Millford mills, was fatally injured while managing a drum at the plant in Millford on Monday, and died in about twenty minutes.

"Mr. Hamilton was alone at the time. In a small outbuilding on the mill property is a drum or spool, connected by shafting with the mill machinery and which is used to operate a long cable for drawing cars to the spot. Mr. Hamilton went into this little building to throw in the clutch, while a young fellow rode on the approaching car. When the car was near the building the cable was released from the head end of the car and immediately the young man heard an outcry from Mr. Hamilton. He ran to the building and discovered Mr. Hamilton lying across the drum, with a length of cable across his body and holding him tightly to it.

"He was quickly released and a surgeon summoned, but he had been hurt beyond human aid and soon passed away.

"It is thought that, having thrown off the clutch which held the power to the cable, he perhaps lost his footing and fell upon the drum, which continued to revolve long enough to wind him upon the latter, one coil binding him so tightly as to crush in his chest upon the left side.

"Mr. Hamilton had lived in Old Town for upward of 40 years, having been in the employ of M. L. Jordan since the latter went into the manufacturing of lumber. For a few years after coming from Canada, where he was born, Mr. Hamilton worked in a mill in Brewer.

He had earned the liking and respect of a wide circle of friends and business associates, who extend to his sorrowing wife and two children, Mrs. Ralph Brown of Greenville and Ruric Hamilton of this city, warmest sympathy in the sudden sorrow that has come upon them.



Famous Painting Only a Forgery

American Recovers \$100,000 in English Courts

Experts Equally Divided

Admission By the Defence Closes the Case—Some Other Notable Cases of Art Frauds—A Fad of the Rich

"Lawsuits as usual," is one of the slogans that continues to do duty in England, in proof whereof one of the most remarkable suits in history has just been brought to a sensational conclusion. The suit was entered by an American, Henry E. Huntington, against Lewis & Simmons, of London, to recover \$100,000 which he had paid them for a painting alleged to have been executed by George Romney, a celebrated English portrait painter of the eighteenth century. Mr. Huntington bought the picture in 1912, and some eighteen months later began to have doubts as to its authenticity. He communicated with the art dealers, who asserted that it was a veritable Romney. They said because it would give them an opportunity to prove absolutely that Romney had painted the portrait. The New York millionaire brought suit, and a formidable array of witnesses appeared on either side.

About half of them swore that the picture was a Romney, and gave convincing evidence in support of their belief. The other half swore
