 Fans Admire Coombs  
 The pitching feats of Jack Coombs during the last year have awakened the admiration of baseball fans. The Colby veteran returned to the pitching box after an illness that would have driven him out of ten into retirement. Even now he works under a handicap that would rob almost any other pitcher of his effectiveness. He wears more straps and braces than a football player, yet he works along with an easy swing that is most remarkable. Every time Coombs gets ready to go out on the field he wears a heavy rubber brace from knee to hip, and supplements this with yards of bandages. Coombs adds a steel brace to his equipment. His protective devices do not rob him of his speed and agility. For Coombs is rated as one of the best fielding pitchers in the major leagues. He is a hitter of ability.

**SAY'S HIGH SCHOOL TEAM HAS NOT WON THE CUP PERMANENTLY**

**INTERNATIONAL BASEBALL SEASON DISASTROUS ONE**

The Fredericton Gleaser in its account of Wednesday's interscholastic football fixture between Fredericton and Rothesay played at the capital, contained the following information: The St. John High School do not need to be mentioned as permanent possessors of the silver trophy this year. The article follows: "By losing yesterday's game the local team went through the league series without a win. Rothesay finished in second place with two victories and two defeats while St. John High School, the winners of the league, went through the season without a trimming. St. John have won the cup emblematic of the championship for the last three years, but are not in permanent possession of the silverware as stated by the St. John papers. In order to hold the silverware for keeps St. John must win the cup for two more years, according to the rules of the Interscholastic Football League."

Providence, R. I., Nov. 8.—That the season of 1916 in the International League was a disastrous one, all round, is shown by reports that are leaking out from the various cities. Every club in the league lost money, including Buffalo, the champion team, where it is admitted by Jos. J. Lannin, owner of the club, a substantial loss was made. Lannin is anxious to sell the club, and efforts are being made to interest Buffalo men in the project of having the club once more locally owned, and it is likely that Patsy Donovan will leave the Sox. Rochester and Newark, and possibly Toronto, will have new managers. Leach has been released by owner Chapin after one year in the saddle. Tommy failed to make good, in Mr. Chapin's opinion. Fred Tenney has quit in Newark, one year in the International being a great plenty for him. Fred failed to make much of an impression in the Barrow wheel. In Toronto, Lena Blackburne finished the season in command, but is not sure of getting the reins next year. Bill Smith is practically sure to return to Richmond, and, of course, Jack Dunn will pilot Baltimore, as he owns the club. Dan Howley did very well in Montreal, and will probably be re-engaged. As to Providence, nothing has been said about next year's team, or who will manage it. The team is for sale, and until this matter is settled little can be said about the managerial end.

The King of Siam is to have a new royal yacht, to cost \$600,000. The Japanese builders of the new craft are to receive in part payment the old Siamese royal yacht, Maha Chakri, built in 1892. The Maha Chakri's draught of 14 feet has been a serious disadvantage when the king made tours along the shallow waters of the Siamese coast, and when he crossed the river bar at Bangkok, the Siamese capital.

**Y. M. C. A. WORK FOR CANADIAN SOLDIERS**

W. S. McAllister of Halifax, general secretary of Y. M. C. A. work in the maritime provinces, was in St. John yesterday arranging for work among the soldiers during the coming winter.

There are now sixty men at the front working among the soldiers, and Major G. W. Binks, chief supervisor, in a recent cablegram to Montreal says that the number should be doubled. Mr. McAllister left for Fredericton, last night, where he will co-operate with the workers there to arrange for some sort of Y. M. C. A. activities among the members of the 280th Kiltie Battalion. It is pointed out by military men that Tucker Park on the Sandy Point road, would be a suitable place for demonstration of trench warfare. It is possible that this property will be used for this purpose.

 The men of the 69th Battalion did great work at Courcellette and the officers of the 22nd Battalion, to which unit the boys of the 69th have been drafted, pay tribute to the reinforcements they drew from the battalion and ask for more.

Major S. S. Wetmore, formerly adjutant of the 25th Battalion, and now transport officer at Shorncliffe, England, is at present in the city. He says that Lieut-Colonel Paul R. Hanson, formerly manager of the Dunlop Rubber Company in this city, is now officer commanding the big Canadian discharge depot at Bath, England.

"Daylight saving" was a success in Austria-Hungary, reports United States Consul General Albert Halstead from Vienna. Commenting on the results of the "daylight saving" experiment, which began on April 30 and finished Sept. 30 last, he says that it proved most beneficial to the health of the Viennese due to the extra sunlight in working hours and also did much to save expenses for lighting. It is calculated, he reports that in Vienna alone the people conserved 128,000,000 cubic feet of gas less and saved \$142,000. The City of Vienna required 14,000,000 cubic feet of gas less for street lighting.
