AUTO WRECKS 3 WAGONS AND KILLS HORSE

Matthew Lynch, of Black River, Cut About Face in Mishap

CHATHAM, N. B., Aug. 27—A serious auto accident occurred on the Chatham Road last night a few miles beyond Chatham when a car driven by Fred Phillips, of Millbank, crashed into four teams, demolishing three wagons and killing a horse. One of the occupants of the carriages, Matthew Lynch, of Black River, was badly cut about the face and had several teeth knocked out.

The four teams were returning home. One team was some distance in advance of the other three. Because of poor headlights, Phillips did not see the advancing team and his machine struck it. Before the driver had regained control of the car the other three teams had come up and the auto crashed into them, breaking up the wagons and injuring one of the horses so badly that it had to be shot. The auto itself was a result of the second crash a virtual wreck.

The driver explained that in the excitement following the first accident he had got over on to the wrong side of the road and as a result he collided with the three teams. The latter were well into the ditch on their own side of the road when struck.

STEAMSHIP CANADA SOLD BY WHITE STAR

The S. S. Canada, which for nearly 30 years has sailed up the St. Lawrence to Montreal, has now been sold to another company by the White Star Line, according to advices received by the Montreal office yesterday. Although the oldest passenger carrier on the Canadian route, she could hold her own in the matter of speed with any other vessel while in the river, as her shorter length and less tonnage enabled her to be more easily navigated. She is a graceful craft and earned the name of "Bob's Yacht" during the Boer War, when she carried Lord Roberts back from South Africa.

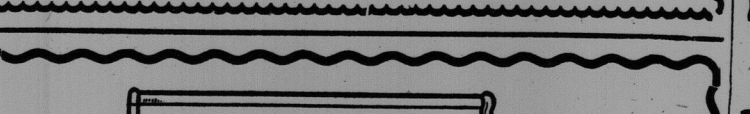
