

REFUND SO FAR ON INCOME TAX ABOUT \$11,000

Some \$15,000 Still to Go Out
From Here to New
Brunswick

About \$11,000 has already been refunded to New Brunswick on over-payments this year to the Dominion government in income tax and about \$15,000 more will be paid back in due time, it was said yesterday by N. P. MacLeod, provincial tax inspector.

Many residents paid the amount of income tax that was required under the regulations of last year and when the 1926 budget, with its reduction of income tax rate became effective, the amount paid in excess was ordered returned to those who had paid the larger sums.

PAYMENTS ARE CHECKED

It is not necessary for the person who has paid an excess amount to apply for the refund it was said yesterday by H. C. Wilson, of the taxation office staff, as payments are being checked over and the refunds are being made systematically from the office.

This is another instance of the "A.Y." getting ahead first, for the refunds are going out in alphabetical order and the clerks in working down the list of names have now arrived at the "M's." The unfortunate "Y's" have yet to wait, but they will be glad to know that it is expected that most of the refunds will be sent out this month.

The amounts going back to individuals have varied greatly and have ranged from sums of less than \$1 upwards. Some of the corporations, which are charged with income tax, have received back as much as \$2,000 and they are about the top notches in the refund class.

INCOME RECEIPTS

To date about \$474,000 has been received in income tax payments in this district as compared with about \$650,000 at the corresponding date last year. As it is estimated that the reduction in the income tax charge amounts to about 20 per cent. off the total sum it would indicate that the incomes in this district in 1926 had been about equal to those of 1925.

The date on which the final payment of income tax must be made is Oct. 30, but the majority of citizens make their full payment at the time when the initial installment is required on April 30 and only a comparatively small amount of income tax is left to be paid in this district.

YANK OUTFIELD IS BETTER ON PAPER

Comparison Made of Outer
Gardens in Coming World
Series Clash

NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—Babe Ruth's huge bulk tips the scales in favor of the New York Yankees as the odds of the outfielders to play in the world series is weighed. St. Louis has no Ruth. The Yankees' slugger with 47 home runs and a batting average of .368 has distanced the best effort of any Cardinal outfielder. If Blakes can join in the Cardinal outfield, Manager Hornsby will offer three 400 hitters with Southworth and Douthett completing the trio. With the injured Blakes probably not in the lineup, Hafey is expected to get the call with Holm next in line. St. Louis outfielders, with Blakes included, although a doubtful starter, have an average of .289. Ruth, Combs and Meusel, the regular Yankee outfield, with Paschall and Carlyle in reserve, boast an average of .318. Ruth dominates the outfield talent involved in the series. His batting average of .368 includes 47 home runs and he has scored 139 runs, and stolen 12 bases. Ruth will also enter his seventh world series. Southworth, who will patrol right field for the Cards, has had more limited world series experience. His batting average of .319 disabled him in part, to score 97 runs and he has made 15 home runs and stolen as many bases.

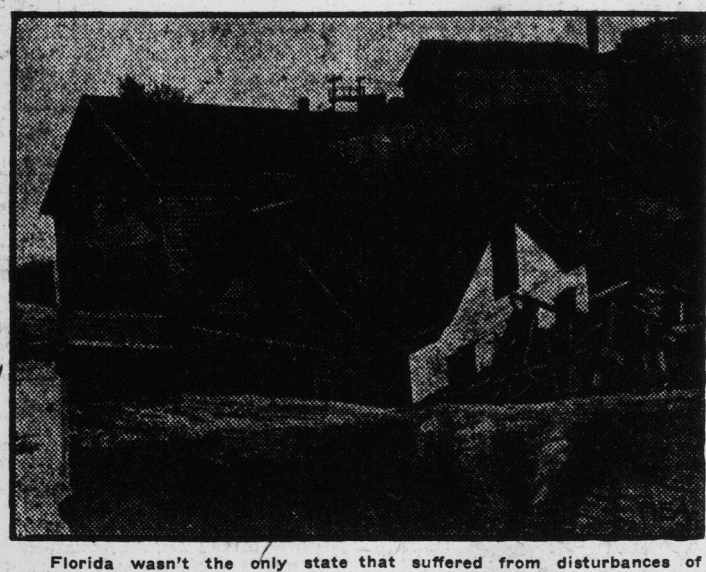

GREECE IS TORN BY POLITICAL CHAOS

Resignation of Premier and Non-
party Government
Demanded

ATHENS, Sept. 28.—Political chaos reigns in Greece, owing to the attitude of the anti-Venizelist parties, which threaten to abstain from the parliamentary elections, unless the government resigns. Opposition leaders, visiting President Kondouriotti, demanded the resignation of Premier Korydis, the formation of the non-party government and parliamentary elections on the majority basis instead of proportional representation. The Premier asserts that the formation of a non-party government is impossible.

N. B. POTATO YIELD EQUALS LAST YEAR

Some Fields in Carleton County
Are Giving 100 Barrels to
Acre

FREDERICTON, Sept. 28.—The provincial department of agriculture report issued yesterday says: The first half of this month was dull and considerable rain fell. The gathering of late hay has been protracted. Only on the Sackville marshes some remains to be cut. The harvesting of grain is in progress, but a large acreage remains to be cut. Some threshing has been done and the outlook of oats and buckwheat is good. The acreage of wheat is less than last year and the yield is below the average.

POTATO CROP GOOD

The digging of early potatoes began two weeks ago in Carleton county and is now general at all points. The digging of the late crop will be begun by the first of October. Very little injury by late blight has occurred. The foliage remains green generally until affected by frost. The yield is quite equal to that of last year. Some fields at Green Mountains have given 100 barrels to the acre.

HON. DR. VENIOT PLANS VISIT TO CITY THIS WEEK

Taking Up Matter of Improv-
ed Shipping Facilities
for Potatoes

Word received in the city is to the effect that Hon. P. J. Veniot, Postmaster-General of Canada, will be in Saint John some day this week. In an interview given at Bathurst after his return from Ottawa, Hon. Dr. Veniot is quoted as saying that improved facilities for shipment of New Brunswick's potato crop is one of the questions which will have his immediate attention. He is taking up the matter as it always has been, that the Valley Railway be taken over by the Federal Government, but under the circumstances I cannot make predictions.

VALLEY RAILWAY

Regarding the Duncan Commission report on the Maritime Hon. Dr. Veniot said it was hoped the cabinet would be able to deal with it before the Prime Minister and his associates have to leave for the Imperial Conference; if not it would be taken up as soon as Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King returned to Canada. Asked as to whether the expected outcome of the Duncan Commission's report would be that the Saint John Valley Railway would be taken over by the Federal Government, Hon. Dr. Veniot replied: "I am anxious, as I always have been, that the Valley Railway be taken over by the Federal Government, but under the circumstances I cannot make predictions."

WORKER IS KILLED AS TANK EXPLODES

Calgary Man Blown Into Stand-
ing Automobile; Neck and
Skull Broken

CALGARY, Alta., Sept. 28.—Battered beyond recognition and hurled 15 feet through the air, Alex Wilson, 27, was instantly killed at the Riverside Iron Works yesterday, when an acetylene tank he was testing, suddenly exploded. The terrible blast rocked the building, three fragments of steel in the air and pitched Wilson heading into a standing automobile. Wilson's neck was broken, his skull fractured, his arms, limbs and ribs smashed, and his clothing torn from his lifeless body.

Daniel McVicar, the only eye-witness to the tragedy, was in the building at the time and suffered from shock. The cause of the explosion has not been determined. An inquest will be held tomorrow.

NATIONS LEAGUE TO TALK FILM PLANS

Questions of Production and
Distribution to Come Within
Scope

PARIS, Sept. 28.—The League of Nations adopted the motion picture yesterday as an addition to its growing family of discussable subjects. Under the auspices of the League, more than 200 delegates from all parts of Europe gathered at the Sorbonne to talk about what can be done in movie-making to make the world a better place. Most of the delegates are French and German.

The agenda includes such subjects as "production" and "distribution" but the former will have to do with the production of pictures with intellectual appeal and moral influence. Under the category of "distribution" will be discussed the dissemination through the rural districts of education films. The delegates will also consider means whereby tariff barriers on educational films may be eliminated.

Another subject which the conference will discuss this week, is a proposal to establish under the league's wings, a great film library in which celluloid masterpieces might be deposited along with films of historical value.
