The thin ranks of prospective rivals for Jack Dempsey suffered another decrease in the meeting between Billy Miske and Tom Gibbons. Miske won the bout on a foul in ten rounds. A kind Providence stepped into the breach and gave Miske victory when it appeared that he would be battered into a crushing defeat. But there was no solace in the triumph for Miske. The result will always be remembered as simply an unsatisfactory and accidental ending to the bout. Another fact which will be remembered is that Miske, at the time he gained the victory, was hopelessly beaten — excelled by Gibbons in every department of boxing; hopelessly outclassed.

Miske was said to have found puglism's Fountain of Youth and to have profited by his discovery. He beat several rival heavyweights, among them Fred Dalton, in a campaign of rehabilitation. His triumps carried enough significance to gain Miske consideration as a probable opponent for Dempsey in a about planned for January here. The glowing reports of Miske's "rejuvenation" appear to have been grossly exaggerated. If he boxed at his best against Gibbons—and there is no plausible reason for supposing that he did not—then Miske is at that stage of a pugilistic decline from which there is no recovery. He is "through," to use the vernacular.

GOLF.
New Golf Grass An Aid. Washington, Oct. 17.—Golf grass to nake golf balls bounce better on the

putting green and the fairways has been developed by the Bureau of Plan Industry of thhe United States Agricultural Department. Creeping bent is the grass which has been found to furnish the ideal turf for the devotees of the Scotch game. The use of this grass has been fought by the seed men because it is not raised from seed. The ideal golf link covering is a running, jointed grass, which sends down roots from each joint, thus forming a thick mat, resistent to wear and drought. The method of planting is to cut up these roots in a chopping box and sow them like seed, but covered somewhat deeper. In this way, a more uniform color and texture is obtained than from grasses raised from seed. Creeping bent is an importation from Germany with which the Agricultural Department has been experimenting for five years. It is cultivated in rows six feet apart and spreads rapidly. A hundred feet of a row is sufficient to sow an entire golf course. Last year 115 golf courses were supplied in this way and the demand is increasing.

Cornell Man's Invention Based on Old Stereoscope Principle - Figures Appear to be Stepping Right

Out of Screen.

New York, Oct. 18—Motion pictures in which the principle of the old-fashloned stereoscope is successfully applied—it is said, for the first time—were shown this week at the Teleview Studio, 456 Broome street. They are the invention of Lawrence Hammond, a young Cornell graduate, who has spent more than two years in experiments in Detroit, Chicago, and this city. With the perfection of his device, the Teleview Corporation of Illinois has been formed, with John Borden, a wealthy Chicagoan, as president, and it is planned to produce a complete stereoscopic film play in this city in the near future.
